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JUNE 2020 DRIVE-IN WORSHIP SERVICES

We will have Drive-In Worship Services every Sunday in June in the FAB parking lot. We will once again be sharing Holy Communion. We will use the pre-sealed wafers and grape juice again. If you cannot or choose not to partake of one of the elements, be assured of Christ's full presence under each element alone. If you do not feel comfortable coming to worship or receiving Communion, rest assured that Christ is with you, you are with us in Spirit, and we will have other opportunities to gather.

Here are some details about our Drive-in Service of Holy Communion:

- Enter the FAB parking lot via the Hanson Avenue entrance only.
- You will be handed a disposable plate with pre-sealed Communion elements for each communing person in your vehicle on it at the entrance. Hold on to these elements as we will commune together during the service. The package is double sealed—the wafer is under the top seal and the juice is under the bottom seal.
- Worship will begin at 9:30 AM. Prelude music will begin at 9:10 AM, 20 minutes prior to the start of the service.
- Set your radio to Radio station 98.1 FM when you arrive. The FM signal is short range, so you will need to be in the FAB parking lot to hear the service on the radio.
- We will have parking assistants to help guide you to a parking place.
- You are welcome to start your car or leave it running if necessary during the service. If you have a large vehicle, consider parking on a farther row back so that everyone will be able to see.
- You may leave the parking lot using all exits.

BULLETIN INFORMATION

You will need to print the bulletin at home; there will be no copies to hand out on Sunday. The bulletin will be posted on www.gslc.com by Thursday afternoon before the Drive-In services. We will also send a link to the bulletin via email by Thursday afternoon. A limited number of copies will be placed outside the church office on a table by Friday at noon.

GUIDELINES

The same guidelines and safety rules we observed in previous parking lot services will apply:

- No one (other than worship leaders and assistants) can get out of the car once you enter our property, either before, during, or after the service. No yard chairs.
- Please, no physical greeting from car to car.
- The playground is off limits and locked.
- Entry to the buildings will not be available (no restroom use).

If you do not feel comfortable coming out or are unable to come, be assured that our service will be posted on the church website by Sunday afternoon as usual and sermon manuscripts will still be mailed out to those who usually receive them.



A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

And see, I am sending upon you what my Father promised; **so stay here** in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high.' – Luke 24:49

Jesus' first disciples had barely adjusted to the news that "he is risen" before Jesus ascended to the Father. His words in Luke 24:49 come right before he was taken up to heaven. The incredible good news of God's salvation was already being proclaimed among his disciples, but then they received some much harder news: "Wait." "Stay here."

This pattern is common in Scripture. Think, for example, of Noah. In Genesis 6 we learn that Noah and his family alone are to be spared from the flood event that will serve as God's cosmic do-over. Noah faithfully builds the ark, gathers the animals, and boards with his family just as the first drops start falling. Now we all know, Noah was onboard the ark for 40 days and 40 nights, right? Actually, it rained for 40 days and 40 nights. Water covered the earth for 150 days, Genesis tells us. And even after those 150 days when Noah's ark landed on Mt. Ararat, he had more months of waiting until the earth was dry enough to emerge again. Just when it seemed his hard work was done, the truly arduous task of waiting began.

Or consider the people of Israel whom God freed from slavery in Egypt. They must have thought their journey to freedom was near an end when they passed unharmed through the Red Sea and looked back to see Pharaoh and his troops swallowed up by the waves. But even as they stood and sang God's praises on the other side of the sea, they had no way of knowing that their arduous journey—40 years of wilderness wandering—was just beginning. More than that, if we consider the history of the Hebrew people and their descendants, we see that true freedom has been elusive even over centuries.

Indeed, the theme of waiting for God's salvation is a constant note in scripture.

Consider Genesis 49:18 — "I wait for your salvation, O LORD."

Or Psalm 27:14 — "Wait for the Lord; be strong, and let your heart take courage; wait for the Lord!"

Or Psalm 130:5 — "I wait for the Lord, my soul waits, and in his word I hope."

There are numerous other passages from Psalms, Proverbs, and the Prophets that speak about waiting for God. Even in the New Testament, we are urged by Paul and other authors to wait patiently for God's coming salvation. For example, in Romans 8:25, we are told: "But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience."

Now is yet another time that God's people are called on to wait patiently for the Lord's salvation. Together, we are enduring a time of trial and difficulty. I know it is popular these days to say, "we are not all in this together" because some of us have a harder time than others. I would remind you that this is not true for the church. For we are indeed one body in Christ. If you are hurting, I am hurting. If the hand or the eye suffers, the whole body suffers. We are indeed in this together because we are one in Christ. During this pandemic, we are going through one of the toughest things any of us has ever had to endure.

And as tempting as it must have been for Noah to jump off the ark right away; as much as God's people longed to be in the Promised Land; as much as the disciples were eager to receive the Spirit and be led into all truth, it is tempting for us to rush back to business as usual. We are eager for normalcy, but we see throughout scripture that God shows up in the waiting time. God acts to save God's people in the wilderness, on the ark, in the locked upper room. We wait with hope and with the assurance that God will act to lead us, guide us, and save us.

We do not know if we have a 40 day wait or a 40 year wait or somewhere in between. Given the science of the situation, I'd say 40 days is much more likely than 40 years; somewhere in between is probably right. But what we do know is that God loves us, God will not leave us, and God will indeed act to save us yet again. We are indeed one body during this time and we trust in Christ, our head. We suffer together, we wait together, and we will be together to see the end of this time and to see a new revelation of God's abundant salvation.

Social Ministry Focus

SOCIAL MINISTRY EMPHASIS – Project HOPE, a program of the Richland County Sheriff's Department to get fans for needy elderly persons in the area, will continue as the Social Ministry Emphasis through June 7. Contributions can be sent to the church office any time until then. Checks should be made to Good Shepherd and designated for Project HOPE.

We will be doing our annual school supply drive in July. Watch for more information later.

FOOD PANTRY

The Food Pantry will no longer accept used plastic grocery bags from the congregation due to health concerns. Food pantry groceries will be filled in new plastic bags.

In order to restock our food pantry for the coming months when we are able to reopen, you are welcome to bring non-perishable food items to the Drive-In services. Place all items in a plastic grocery bag and hand it out your window to an assistant (who will be gloved and masked) on the way out of the parking lot. No loose items and no personal contact, please!

In February, food pantry volunteers packed and distributed 52 bags of groceries serving 226 individuals.

In March for 3 Wednesdays that the food pantry was open, food pantry volunteers packed 51 bags of groceries serving 197 individuals.

LEARNING COMMITTEE UPDATES VBS

With a heavy heart, the call was made to cancel VBS due to the pandemic. As heartbreaking as this is to cancel this special event that the children and our volunteers all love, it is our desire to keep everyone's safety and well-being as our top priority. **GRACEWORKS** will be done virtually this year and will be geared toward the whole family. 
Millie Sox, 32 Running Fox Road, Columbia, SC 29223

Brock Tollison, 2928 Bagnal Drive, Columbia SC 29204



LECTIONARY FOR JUNE 2020

JUNE 7 – THE HOLY TRINITY

Though the word *trinity* is not found in the scriptures, today's second reading includes the apostolic greeting that begins the liturgy: The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all. In the gospel Jesus sends his disciples forth to baptize in the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit. More than a doctrine, the Trinity expresses the heart of our faith: we have experienced the God of creation made known in Jesus Christ and with us always through the Holy Spirit. We celebrate the mystery of the Holy Trinity in word and sacrament, as we profess the creed, and as we are sent into the world to bear witness to our faith.

FIRST READING – Genesis 1:1—2:4a

At the beginning of time, God the Creator, God the powerful Word, and God the life-giving Spirit form the earth and all its inhabitants. God sees that all this created work is good and then rests on the seventh day.

PSALM – Psalm 8

How majestic is your name in all the earth! (Ps. 8:1) **SECOND READING – 2 Corinthians 13:11-13**

Paul closes a challenging letter to the Corinthians with an appeal to Christian fellowship grounded in the triune harmony of Christ's grace, God's love, and the Spirit's partnership.

GOSPEL – Matthew 28:16-20

After his resurrection, Jesus summons his remaining disciples and commissions them to baptize and teach all nations in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

<u>JUNE 14 – 2ND SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST</u>

Moses tells the Israelites that they are called to be a priestly kingdom and a holy people. Jesus sends out the disciples as laborers into the harvest. In baptism we too are anointed for ministry, sharing God's compassion with our needy world. From the Lord's table we go forth to proclaim the good news, to heal the sick, and to share our bread with the hungry.

FIRST READING – Exodus 19:2-8a

At Sinai God assured Israel, "You shall be my treasured possession," and commissioned them to serve as mediating priests for the nations. The people commit themselves completely to God's will.

PSALM – Psalm 100

We are God's people and the sheep of God's pasture. (Ps. 100:3)

SECOND READING – Romans 5:1-8

We are no longer God's enemies but have peace with God because we were brought into a right relationship with God through Christ's death.

GOSPEL – Matthew 9:35—10:8[9-23]

The mission of Jesus' followers is to continue the mission of Jesus himself. Here, he instructs his first disciples as to how they might proclaim the gospel through their words and deeds.

JUNE 21 – 3RD SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

God does not promise that the path of the disciple will be easy. Jeremiah feels the pain of rejection from those who do not want to hear what he has to say. Jesus declares that his words may bring stark division. Even so, we need not be afraid for God accounts for each hair on our heads. Though we may experience rejection, frustration, division, and death, God's grace and love make us a new creation each day. Marked with the cross and filled with holy food, we are sent from worship to witness to Christ in the world.

FIRST READING – Jeremiah 20:7-13

Jeremiah accuses God of forcing him into a ministry that brings him only contempt and persecution. Yet Jeremiah is confident that God will be a strong protector against his enemies and commits his life into God's hands.

PSALM – Psalm 69:7-10 [11-15] 16-18

Answer me, O LORD, for your love is kind. (Ps. 69:16) **SECOND READING – Romans 6:1b-11**

In baptism we were incorporated into the reality of Christ's death and resurrection. We have been made new in Christ through his death and resurrection to live freed from sin.

GOSPEL – Matthew 10:24-39

Jesus warns his disciples that their ministry in his name will meet with opposition. However, he assures them that they need not fear for the truth will come to light. Life is found in Christ.

JUNE 28 – 4TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

The welcome of baptism is for all God's children. This baptismal gift sets us free from the power of sin and death. In today's gospel, Christ promises that the disciple who gives a cup of cold water to the little ones serves Christ himself. From worship we are sent on our baptismal mission: to serve the little ones of this world and to be a sign of God's merciful welcome.

FIRST READING – Jeremiah 28:5-9

Through a symbolic action Jeremiah insisted that Judah and all the surrounding nations should submit to the king of Babylon (Jer. 27). Hananiah contradicted the word of Jeremiah, who in reply insisted that Hananiah's rosy prediction should not be believed until it came true. God confirmed the word of Jeremiah and sentenced the false prophet Hananiah to death (vv. 16-17).

PSALM – Psalm 89:1-4, 15-18

Your love, O LORD, forever will I sing. (Ps. 89:1) SECOND READING – Romand 6:12-23

Sin is an enslaving power which motivates us to live selfserving, disobedient lives. Sin's final payoff is death. We, however, have been set free from sin's slavery to live obediently under God's grace, whose end is the free gift of eternal life.

GOSPEL – Matthew 10:40-42

When Jesus sends his disciples out as missionaries, he warns them of persecution and hardships they will face. He also promises to reward any who aid his followers and support their ministry.

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
