
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FALL STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN

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A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR



Every generous act of giving, with every perfect gift, is from above.

James 1:17a

In our house Michelle and I have a picture frame which contains a picture of us with our son James when he was just a few months old. The scripture verse above is inscribed on the frame and it is one of my favorite passages in scripture. Indeed, the book of James is one of my favorite books of the Bible. In his preface to the New

Testament, Martin Luther famously derided the book of James as "an Epistle of straw compared with [the letters of Paul and John], for it has nothing of the nature of the gospel about it." Luther said this, most likely, because his opponents used James' insistence that "faith without works is dead" to support the notion that it is our works that save us. Luther, with his singular focus on God's saving grace, did not want to give his challengers any leeway to distract from the good news of our salvation by God's grace alone. But in spite of Luther's criticism of the Epistle of James, I encourage you to read this letter because it has so much to say to us even in this day and age.

There is the passage I mentioned at the start of this article—James 1:17—which seems an especially timely reminder of our manifold blessings. In our first year together as pastor and people I have spoken and written to you often about noticing and celebrating and trusting in God's great abundance in our midst. Not even the ongoing pandemic can obscure God's bountiful provision for us. In fact, for me this time of difficulty and struggle has driven me to trust in God more fully than I might be inclined to do when everything is going well. I hope you have continued to be aware of God's abundance during this time.

James' wealth of sage and practical advice continues: Elsewhere in chapter 1, James warns us about the impermanence of wealth and encourages us that suffering and trials are pathways to endurance and greater faith. James also counsels us to not just hear God's word, but also to act on it in faith, as well as to care for orphans and widows in their distress. These are indeed timely reminders.

In James 2, we hear warnings about showing partiality and treating others differently based on their class or status. In a time where there is an increasing focus on race and equality in our nation, James speaks words that remind us to treat others well no matter what and to show mercy abundantly. It is also in chapter 2 that we hear the famous words I mentioned above: "faith without works is dead." James has a powerful and pointed way of calling out hypocrisy and idleness.

In chapter 3, we get timely reminders to always keep a close reign on our tongues—indeed, the power of works spoken carelessly or maliciously can cause a world of trouble for us and for others. In addition, James warns us against being wise by the world's standards, contrasting this with true wisdom that is from above. We would all do well to govern ourselves accordingly.

Among other highlights in James chapter 4, we hear a reminder that should resonate with us mightily at this time: We are but a mist—here one minute and gone the next. Whatever we plan to do in the future may or may not happen. I can really relate to this passage in our current day and age when it seems our plans and practices change on a daily basis. In the midst of such change and challenge, we are to trust God to provide for us and guide us always.

In chapter 5, James urges us to be patient in times of suffering and persistent in prayer. Finally, he counsels us to confess wrongdoing to one another, and catch one another whenever we may slip and fall.

I hope you will take the time sometime this month to read and reflect on the Epistle of James. Though it is a short book, it contains a rich array of admonishment and advice. James' first readers were likely living during uncertain and oppressive times. God is still at work through these scriptures today, guarding and guiding us always. Do not just read this Epistle; take it to heart and live it out. As James himself urges, do not just be hearers, but also doers of the Word. With love in Christ,

At Sunday's council meeting, the Finance Committee submitted a motion to transfer \$50,000 from excess checking account funds to major capital. Those funds give us a great start on rebuilding of that account. We continue to need donations to bring this account back to the \$100,000 level.

The work on the HVAC in the Education Building should begin around October. The Narthex roof work continues to be in progress. We are waiting on another insurance settlement between VM Zinc and the contractor.








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COLLEGE GRADUATION

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LECTIONARY FOR SEPTEMBER 2020

SEPTEMBER 6 – 14TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Conflict is a part of relationships and life in community. Jesus' words in today's gospel are often used in situations having to do with church discipline. The prophet Ezekiel tells of warning the wicked to turn from their ways, and Paul reminds us that love is the fulfilling of the law. We gather in the name of Christ, assured that he is present among us with gifts of peace and reconciliation.

FIRST READING - Ezekiel 33:7-11

God appointed Ezekiel as a sentinel for the house of Israel. Ezekiel must faithfully convey God's warnings to the people. Remarkably, God—who is about to attack Jerusalem—gives a warning with the hope that repentance will make the attack unnecessary.

PSALM - Psalm 119:33-40

I desire the path of your commandments. (Ps. 119:35) SECOND READING – Romans 13:8-14

The obligation of Christians is to love one another and so fulfill the heart and goal of the law. Clothes make the person as we "put on the Lord Jesus Christ" and live today in light of the future God has in store for us.

GOSPEL - Matthew 18:15-20

Jesus offers practical advice to his disciples on how individuals—and the church as a whole—should go about restoring relationships when one member has sinned against another.

<u>SEPTEMBER 13 – 15TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST</u>

In today's second reading Paul questions why we judge one another, since we all stand before the judgment of God. Yet we do sin against one another, and Jesus' challenge that we forgive seventy-seven times reveals God's boundless mercy. When we hear the words of forgiveness in worship and sign ourselves with the cross, we are renewed in baptism to be signs of reconciliation in the world.

FIRST READING - Genesis 50:15-21

After Jacob's death the brothers of Joseph begged for forgiveness for the crime they had done against him. You intended to do me harm, Joseph said, but God used this as an opportunity to do good and save many lives.

PSALM – Psalm 103:1-13

LORD, you are full of compassion and mercy. (Ps. 103:8) **SECOND READING – Romans 14:1-12**

This Christian community has significant struggles with diversity. Here Paul helps us understand that despite different practices in worship and personal piety, we do not judge one another. All Christians belong to the Lord Jesus Christ who died for all of us and will judge each of us.

GOSPEL - Matthew 18:21-35

When Peter asks about the limits of forgiveness, Jesus responds with a parable that suggests human forgiveness should mirror the unlimited mercy of God.

SEPTEMBER 20 - 16TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Matthew narrates one of Jesus' controversial parables in which Jesus says that the reign of God is like that of a landowner who pays his workers the same wage no matter what time of day they began to work. When God changes God's mind about punishing Nineveh for their evil ways, Jonah is angry. Yet God is gracious and merciful, abounding in steadfast love. In baptism we receive the grace of God that is freely given to all. As Martin Luther wrote, in the presence of God's mercy we are all beggars.

FIRST READING - Jonah 3:10-4:11

After Jonah's short sermon in 3:4, the Ninevites all repented and God decided to spare the city. Jonah objected to this and became even more angry when God ordered a worm to destroy a plant that was providing shade. The book ends with a question that challenges any who are not ready to forgive: You, Jonah, are all worked up about a bush, but shouldn't I be concerned about a hundred and twenty thousand Ninevites?

PSALM – Psalm 145:1-8

The LORD is slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love. (Ps. 145:8)

SECOND READING - Philippians 1:21-30

Paul writes to the Philippians from prison. Though he is uncertain about the outcome of his imprisonment, he is committed to the ministry of the gospel and calls on the Philippians to live lives that reflect and enhance the gospel mission.

GOSPEL - Matthew 20:1-16

Jesus tells a parable about God's generosity, challenging the common assumption that God rewards people according to what they have earned or deserve.

SEPTEMBER 27 – 17TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Jesus' parable about two sons who don't do what they say reveals surprises in the reign of God. In the reading from Ezekiel the people claim the ways of the Lord are unfair, while God offers repentance and new life. Paul urges us to look to Christ as a model of humility, putting the interests of others above our own. Nourished by the broken bread and shared cup, we offer our lives for the sake of our needy world.

FIRST READING - Ezekiel 18:1-4, 25-32

Ezekiel challenges those who think they cannot change because of what their parents were and did, or who think they cannot reverse their own previous behavior. God insistently invites people to turn and live.

PSALM - Psalm 25:1-9

Remember, O LORD, your compassion and love. (Ps. 25:6) **SECOND READING – Philippians 2:1-13**

As part of a call for harmony rather than self-seeking, Paul uses a very early Christian hymn that extols the selflessness of Christ in his obedient death on the cross. Christ's selfless perspective is to be the essential perspective we share as the foundation for Christian accord.

GOSPEL – Matthew 16:13-20

After driving the moneychangers out of the temple (21:12), Jesus begins teaching there. His authority is questioned by the religious leaders, who are supposed to be in charge of the temple.
