A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR



When I was growing up, I remember each Pentecost Sunday hearing that Pentecost was “the birthday of the church.” One year during a children’s sermon, we were even given party hats to wear to celebrate that event.

The festival we call Pentecost commemorates a story from Acts 2: The day that the Apostles gathered in Jerusalem and felt the rush of a mighty wind compelling them to proclaim the gospel to the crowds. Each person in the crowd heard the Apostolic proclamation of the gospel in his or her own language.

That event certainly marked the church’s shift toward a public witness about Jesus, but is it accurate to call it the church’s “birthday?” While not incorrect, this image of the Spirit’s coming upon the church as a singular historical event doesn’t give us the full picture. If there is anything we see about the Holy Spirit in scripture, it is that the Spirit delights in surprising God’s people with unexpected and multifaceted activity. For example:

- On the Second Sunday of Easter, we heard Jesus’ words to his disciples a full 49 days before that first Pentecost: He breathed on them and said, “Receive the Holy Spirit.”
- We know that the Spirit was present and active in the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth. At that time, when the earth was formless and void, the Spirit of God brooded over the murky chaos out of which God made all that exists.
- We confess in the Nicene Creed that the Holy Spirit has spoken through the prophets. Likewise, the Spirit was active in the Incarnation of Jesus.
- Throughout the book of Acts, we see the Spirit constantly showing up in ways that shock and rattle God’s people. The Spirit upsets their plans and moves them to do new and bold things (such as baptizing a eunuch from Africa, dining with Gentiles and including them in the fellowship of an exclusively Jewish church, and changing course to visit foreign lands and unfamiliar people.)

This manifold and tireless activity of the Spirit makes me wonder: Should we wear party hats to commemorate the “birthday of the church” on Pentecost? Perhaps it would be more fitting to put on hard hats and then, to hold onto those hats!

The Spirit’s coming at Pentecost was not the Spirit’s first appearance and, thanks be to God, was not the Spirit’s last appearance. The Holy Spirit is still active in our midst. That should make us thankful, but it should also fill us with anticipation. My prayer for us this Pentecost and beyond is that the Spirit would come again and rouse us to new and exciting possibilities. May we be as open to the Spirit’s momentum as those first disciples were.

LECTIONARY FOR MAY 2021

MAY 2 – FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

This Sunday's image of how the risen Christ shares his life with us is the image of the vine. Christ the vine and we the branches are alive in each other, in the mystery of mutual abiding described in the gospel and the first letter of John. Baptism makes us a part of Christ's living and life-giving self and makes us alive with Christ's life. As the vine brings food to the branches, Christ feeds us at his table. We are sent out to bear fruit for the life of the world.

FIRST READING – Acts 8:26-40

Led by the Spirit, Philip encounters an Ethiopian official who is returning to his African home after having been to Jerusalem to worship. Philip uses their encounter to proclaim the gospel to him. Upon coming to faith in Jesus, he is baptized by Philip.

PSALM – Psalm 22:25-31

All the ends of the earth shall remember and turn to the LORD. (Ps. 22:27)

SECOND READING – 1 John 4:7-21

We love God and others because God first loved us. We cannot say we love God, whom we have not seen, while hating fellow Christians, whom we regularly see. Love toward God is to be matched by love toward others because the essence of God is love.

GOSPEL – John 15:1-8

On the night of his arrest, Jesus taught his disciples about the relationship they would have with him. Those who abide in his word and love bear fruit, for apart from him, they can do nothing.

MAY 9 – SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

This Sunday's image of the life the risen Christ shares with us is the image of friendship. We are called to serve others as Jesus came to serve; but for John's gospel, the image of servanthood is too hierarchical, too distant, to capture the essence of life with Christ. Friendship captures the love, the joy, the deep mutuality of the relationship into which Christ invites us. The Greeks believed that true friends are willing to die for each other. This is the mutual love of Christian community commanded by Christ and enabled by the Spirit.

FIRST READING – Acts 10:44-48

While Peter shares the good news of Jesus with a Gentile soldier and his family, the Holy Spirit comes upon them. Recognizing that the Spirit works inclusively in the lives of both Jews and Gentiles, Peter commands that these Gentiles also be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ.

PSALM – Psalm 98

Shout with joy to the LORD, all you lands. (Ps. 98:4)

SECOND READING – 1 John 5:1-6

God's children believe that Jesus is the Messiah and love God by keeping God's commandments. Thus the world is conquered not through military might but through love and faith.

GOSPEL – John 15:9-17

On the night of his arrest, Jesus delivers a final testimony to his disciples to help them in the days ahead. Here, he repeats the most important of all his commands, that they love one another.

MAY 16 – SEVENTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

The gospel for Easter's seventh Sunday is always taken from the long prayer Jesus prays for his followers in John's gospel on the night before his death, and always includes Jesus' desire that his followers will be one as he and the Father are one. This oneness is not mere doctrinal agreement or institutional unity, but mutual abiding, interpenetrating life, mutual love, and joy. This oneness is the work of the Spirit whom we have received but also await. Come, Holy Spirit!

FIRST READING – Acts 1:15-17, 21-26

In the days between Jesus' ascension and Pentecost, Peter oversees the process whereby one of the members of the community of believers is chosen to be the twelfth apostle, in order to fill the vacancy created by Judas's treachery and death.

PSALM – Psalm 1

The LORD knows the way of the righteous. (Ps. 1:6)

SECOND READING – 1 John 5:9-13

God has borne witness to the gift of eternal life in Jesus Christ. Whoever believes in the Son of God believes in the witness of God and has the promise of eternal life.

GOSPEL – John 17:6-19

In this reading the church hears Jesus' words on the night before his death—his prayer for his disciples and for all who would believe in him through their words.

MAY 23 – DAY OF PENTECOST

Fifty days after Easter, we celebrate the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost. Crossing all boundaries that would separate us, the Spirit brings the wideness of God's mercy to places we least expect it—to a crowd of strangers of different lands and tongues, to dry bones, to our weak hearts. Jesus promises his disciples that they will be accompanied by the Holy Spirit, and that this Spirit reveals the truth. We celebrate that we too have been visited with this same Spirit. Guided by the truth, we join together in worship, and then disperse to share the fullness of Christ's love with the world.

FIRST READING – Acts 2:1-21

Originally Pentecost was a Jewish thanksgiving-type festival celebrated seven weeks after Passover. On this particular Pentecost, however, the Holy Spirit is poured out upon the entire community of believers just as Jesus had promised and the scriptures had prophesied. Empowered by the Spirit, the entire community bears witness to God's activity in multiple languages.

PSALM – Psalm 104:24-34, 35b

Send forth your Spirit and renew the face of the earth. (Ps. 104:30)

SECOND READING – Romans 8:22-27

By pouring the Holy Spirit into our hearts, God gives us the promised first fruit of eternal life so that we await God's future in hope. In the meantime, the Spirit also intercedes for us by carrying the prayers of our weak human hearts to God.

GOSPEL – John 15:26-27, 16:4b-15

While speaking to his disciples before his death, Jesus refers to the Holy Spirit as "the Helper" and describes the difference the Spirit will make in their lives and in the world.

MAY 30 – THE HOLY TRINITY

When we say God is the triune God, we are saying something about who God is beyond, before, and after the universe: that there is community within God. Our experience of this is reflected in Paul's words today. When we pray to God as Jesus prayed to his Abba (an everyday, intimate parental address), the Spirit prays within us, creating between us and God the same relationship Jesus has with the one who sent him.

FIRST READING – Isaiah 6:1-8

This reading narrates Isaiah's vision of the Lord surrounded by angels. They sing "Holy, holy, holy," a song the church sings at the beginning of the great thanksgiving. This liturgical text invites the church and all creation to sing in praise of God's glory. That glory is God's mercy toward sinners.

PSALM – Psalm 29

Worship the LORD in the beauty of holiness. (Ps. 29:2)

SECOND READING – Romans 8:12-17

In describing the new life of faith, Paul refers to all three persons of the Trinity: the Spirit leads us to recognize that we are children of God the Father and joint heirs with Christ the Son.

GOSPEL – John 3:1-17

Jesus' miracles prompt Nicodemus to visit him in secrecy. Jesus tells him about being born of the Spirit and about the Son who has been sent by God to save.
