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CHRISTMAS IN JULY FOR BOYS FARM

If you think you see a Christmas Tree in the Narthex during July, it won't be your imagination. There really will be a Christmas Tree there!



It will be part of the Social Ministry Committee's "Christmas in July" celebration for the Boys Farm in Newberry. COVID restrictions prevented us doing something in December, so we're giving the congregation the chance to provide "Christmas Gifts" in July for Boys Farm residents.

The tree and lists of possible gifts will be in the Narthex all during the month. You can get a gift and bring it wrapped or unwrapped to put under the tree. Or you may make a financial contribution during the month. Make checks payable to Good Shepherd and designate them for Boys Farm.

The Boys Farm was established more than 50 years ago and provides unique foster care services for boys experiencing difficult family situations. Residents live in cottages with house parents dedicated to providing a nurturing, structured family environment. The boys are taught interpersonal skills, moral values, work ethics and citizenship.

The farm has four cottages, two for ages 6-12 and two for ages 13-18. Here are some gift possibilities: State park pass for two cottages, four camping hammocks with tree straps for a 6-12 cottage and seven camping hammocks with tree straps for a 13-18 cottage, a portable basketball stand for a 6-12 cottage and one for a 13-18 cottage, three basketballs for a 6-12 cottage, and seven sleeping bags or individual tents for a 13-18 cottage.

The Farm also is planning a trip to Carowinds, so you may sponsor one or more participants for \$35 each. And any other gifts appropriate for boys in the 6-18 age range would be accepted as well. So get out the wrapping paper, gift bags and Christmas Cards and plan to help us celebrate "Christmas in July" at the Newberry Boys Farm.

A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR



Jesus said to them, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty. –John 6:35

The "bread of life" passages in the Gospel of John are likely familiar to most of us. If they are not already, they soon will be. For 5 straight weeks of late July and early August, we hear Jesus' lengthy discussion about bread. We may begin to wonder what more can be said about bread, but it is no accident that we have this intensive focus on Jesus, the bread of life. As we walk through this weeks-long series of

lessons together, we begin to see the importance not just of coming to Jesus when we are in need or when we want something, but rather coming to Jesus and remaining in him no matter what.

The encounter between Jesus and the crowds begins with the well-known miracle (or sign, as John calls it) of the feeding of the 5,000. This sign points beyond the mere bread and fish Jesus uses to feed the multitudes and points towards Jesus as the source of abundance and life for all people.

Yet the next day, the same crowds return and Jesus sees their true motivation. He tells them pointedly that they have not come back because they have believed in him, but rather because they got a free meal the day before and are now hungry again. Jesus teaches the crowds over and over again that he is the source of life and that they must trust him and remain in him. Upon hearing these teachings, the crowds respond with disappointment, saying "this is a hard teaching. Who can accept it?" Many of those people leave Jesus and no longer follow him. They turn away to other, lesser sources of life and sustenance.

Upon their turning away, Jesus turns to the 12 disciples and asks them if they also wish to leave him. Simon Peter answers (in the words we often sing as a gospel acclamation): "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life!" Even though Peter and the other followers of Jesus did not yet fully comprehend Jesus' teachings, they recognized him to be their source of life.

The past year of pandemic time has been difficult for us in many ways, not the least of which is the significant changes to our worship and Communion practices. Some of us have begun communing in new and unfamiliar ways. Some of us have not communed for a very long time. As we begin to get back to a more normal way of life together, Jesus invites us to draw near and receive his own body and blood as our food and drink. We are invited to fill our stomachs, our bodies' cells, and our very souls with Jesus, the bread of life. This invitation is the Lord's, but I extend to you the invitation, as well. If you are already active in our life together at Good Shepherd, continue to come and be fed and filled, that you in turn may feed and fill others. If you are not as active as you feel God calling you to be, I invite you all the more: Come and be fed and filled. Together, we receive our life and our sustenance from Christ our Lord. We need more of him in our lives and we need each other, also. Come to worship, come to the table, come to Jesus.

Pastor Andrew also sends a weekly bible study packet, which is a great resource for members that do not prefer, or do not have Zoom capabilities.

Spark Family located by church office (Preschool -5th Grade)

Spark Family is a devotional based on seasons and themes from the Bible. It's filled with quick and easy ways to fit faith into everyday life. Because it's not dated, you can choose to follow the chapters sequentially or skip around. Spark Family is a great resource to keep in the car, carry along as you run errands throughout the day, or leave on the kitchen table for conversation starters during dinner.

Faith 5 (All ages)

A five step nighttime ritual that can instill a sense of security and optimism in children. This plan also helps parents nurture their children's faith, and create a caring, close-knit family unit. Pastor Andrew sends a weekly devotion via email that parents can use to start the process.

There are 5 Steps:

Share your highs and lows of the day/week.
Read a bible verse or story together.
Talk about how your Bible verse or Bible story might apply to your highs and lows.
Pray for one another's highs and lows.
Bless one another before saying goodnight

FOOD PANTRY UPDATE

GSLC Food Pantry Volunteers packed and distributed 12 food bags serving 46 participants in May.

SUPPORTING SOCIAL MINISTRY

The congregation is continuing to provide outstanding support for our social ministry projects.

We received \$900 during May for Project HOPE, a program sponsored by the Richland County Sheriff's Department to support needy elderly persons in the county. Good Shepherd's donation will be used to buy electric fans for needy persons to help deal with the typical hot, humid weather in our area.

The total received May 30 in our quarterly "noisy offering" was \$644.10. That money has been given to the S.C. Synod's Tanzania Mission Project and will be used to buy seeds for avocado trees to be planted in our partner Synod area in Southwest Tanzania. The avocado trees will then help provide ongoing financial support for youth projects for the Lutheran Church in Southwest Tanzania.

We also recently gave checks for \$1,020 to each of three homeless shelters in Columbia. That total of \$3,060 was received from our Lenten Self-Denial Offerings. The checks went to The Family Shelter, Providence Home for Men, and The Women's Shelter.



LECTIONARY FOR JULY 2021

JULY 4—6TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Jesus does great deeds of power and gives his disciples authority over demons. Yet none of this power is unilateral; it all must be received by faith. Jesus asks his disciples to go out without money or supplies, so that they will be dependent on how others receive them. When we are sent from the assembly to witness and to heal, we are asked to be vulnerable, to be dependent on the reception of others. The Spirit always operates in the "between": between Jesus and his Abba, between Jesus and us, between you and me, between us and those to whom we are sent.

FIRST READING – Ezekiel 2:1-5

In 597 BCE, the priest Ezekiel was removed into exile in Babylon. While there, he received a vision of God appearing majestically on a chariot throne. Today's reading recounts God's commissioning of Ezekiel during this vision. The prophet is to speak God's word to a people unwilling to hear. **PSALM – Psalm 123**

Our eyes look to you, O God, until you show us your mercy. (Ps. 123:2)

SECOND READING – 2 Corinthians 12:2-10

Christians do not boast of their own accomplishments. Rather, Christian boasting focuses attention on how the power of Christ is present in our lives, especially in times of weakness and vulnerability. No matter what our circumstances in life, Christ's grace is sufficient for us.

GOSPEL – Mark 6:1-13

At home and abroad, Jesus and his disciples encounter resistance as they seek to proclaim God's word and relieve affliction.

JULY 11—7TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

When Amos reports his vision of God judging Israel for its mistreatment of the poor, he becomes a threat to the power of the priests and the king. John the Baptist also speaks truth to power, and Herod has him killed. In Herod's fear that Jesus is John returned from the dead, we may hear hope for the oppressed: all the prophets killed through the ages are alive in Jesus. We are called to witness to justice in company with them, and to proclaim God's saving love.

FIRST READING – Amos 7:7-15

Amos is not the kind of prophet attached to temples or royal courts. Rather, he is an ordinary farmer from Judah (the southern kingdom) called by God to speak to Israel (the northern kingdom). God's word of judgment through Amos conflicts with the king's court prophet Amaziah, whom Amos encounters at Bethel.

PSALM – Psalm 85:8-13

I will listen to what the LORD God is saying. (Ps. 85:8) **SECOND READING – Ephesians 1:3-14**

In Jesus, all of God's plans and purposes have been made known as heaven and earth are united in Christ. Through Jesus, we have been chosen as God's children and have been promised eternal salvation.

GOSPEL – Mark 6:14-29

As Jesus and his disciples begin to attract attention, Mark recalls the story of John the Baptist's martyrdom. Like John, Jesus and his disciples will also suffer at the hands of those opposed to the gospel of salvation.

JULY 18—8TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Mark's gospel makes clear how great is the press of the crowd, with its countless needs to be met, on Jesus and his disciples. Yet in today's gospel Jesus advises his disciples to get away and rest, to take care of themselves. Sometimes we think that when others are in great need we shouldn't think of ourselves at all; but Jesus also honors the caregivers' need. We are sent from Christ's table to care for others and for ourselves.

FIRST READING – Jeremiah 23:1-6

Jeremiah prophesied before the exile in 587 BCE. In this passage, he uses the metaphor of a shepherd to describe the bad kings who have scattered the "flock" of Israel. God promises to gather the flock and to raise up a new king from David's line to save Israel and Judah.

PSALM – Psalm 23

The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not be in want. (Ps. 23:1) **SECOND READING – Ephesians 2:11-22**

The author of this letter reminds his audience that originally they were not part of God's chosen people. Through Jesus' death, however, they are included in God's household of faith, whose cornerstone is Jesus Christ.

GOSPEL - Mark 6:30-34, 53-56

When Jesus sends his disciples out to teach and heal, they minister among large numbers of people. Their work is motivated by Christ's desire to be among those in need.

JULY 25—9TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Today is the first of five Sundays with gospel readings from John 6, the first four of which focus on Jesus as bread of life. Today Jesus feeds thousands of people with five loaves and two fish. What we have, what we bring to Jesus' table, seems like it is not nearly enough to meet all the needs we see around us. But it is not the adequacy of our supplies or our skills that finally makes the difference: it is the power of Jesus working in the littlest and least to transform this world into the world God desires, a world where all the hungry are satisfied.

FIRST READING – 2 Kings 4:42-44

Today's reading is part of a larger section of 2 Kings that describes the miracles of Elisha, the successor to Elijah. Here the prophet gives food to a hungry crowd. Though there is not enough food to go around, Elisha trusts God, who provides enough and even more to satisfy the need.

PSALM – Psalm 145:10-18

You open wide your hand and satisfy the desire of every living thing. (Ps. 145:16)

SECOND READING – Ephesians 3:14-21

We have been rooted and grounded in the love of Christ, which surpasses all human knowledge. Because Christ dwells in our hearts, our lives are continuously strengthened and empowered by the ongoing presence of the Spirit.

GOSPEL – John 6:1-21

In John's gospel, the miracles of Jesus are called "signs," because they reveal the true character of God. As such, they remain within the mystery of God and cannot be brought under human control.


