STEWARDSHIP 2021-2022

"Renew, Respond, Reach Out"
2 Timothy1:6-7: "Rekindle the gift of God"

It is difficult to believe that it has been almost one year since we had to approach our Stewardship campaign in a relatively different manner. So much of what we offered in worship was held in the parking lot or streamed online. However, it was through the hard work and willingness of our staff and members that God's word continued to be shared with so many during this time.

I must admit, however, I had deeply missed the sense of community that I experienced the day we were able to join together for worship inside our Sanctuary; coming together to hear God's word, singing hymns of joy and (Continued on page 4)

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A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR



The last few months in this publication I have encouraged us to heed the words of various epistles. We've looked at some of Paul's letters in past months; now we turn our attention this month to the Epistle of James. I wrote to you in September of 2020 about the book of James. It seems timely that our lectionary cycle brings this letter back to our attention this month.

We Lutherans have an interesting history with this particular book of the Bible. As I mentioned last year, Luther himself called the book of James "an epistle of straw." I think it is likely he said this in order to weaken the position of his opponents who were arguing that good works were necessary for salvation, based on James 2:17, "faith

without works is dead." Had Luther exalted the book of James, his opponents would have had additional fodder for their argument against Luther's bold assertion (indeed, Paul's bold assertion) that "we are saved by God's grace through faith alone."

Contrary to Luther's assessment of James, I've always found the book of James eminently practical. I find James' direct—even abrupt—tone refreshing. For instance, in our New Testament reading for September 5, James says this:

¹⁴ What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? ¹⁵ If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, ¹⁶ and one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill," and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? ¹⁷ So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.

James certainly doesn't beat around the bush, does he? Rather than being concerned with whether works are necessary for salvation (as Paul and Martin Luther were), James is concerned instead with *how* we live out God's gift of salvation in our daily lives. His point is that an empty expression of one's faith—saying one is a Christian or claiming to be holy or righteous, while acting in a non-Christian and unrighteous way—is useless. Such "faith" isn't really faith at all. It is a sham.

The challenge for us here in this epistle lesson is to strive to make our actions match our words. If we say we are those who follow Jesus, do our actions truly reflect the actions Jesus did during his earthly ministry? If we say we are members of a congregation, do our actions and our priorities in living actually match up with our words?

James' epistle has a tendency to be rather convicting. If you're feeling a bit convicted that perhaps your works are not lining up well with your faith, I encourage you to find ways to put your faith into action. For you, perhaps that means recommitting to worship in person or on YouTube. Perhaps it means attending a Bible Study on Tuesdays or Wednesdays. Perhaps it means putting church activities on your monthly schedule first rather than giving church whatever is left over at the end of the month. Perhaps it looks like joining a new committee or increasing your giving of time or talents or money.

I hope you accept this challenge with me to help our actions match up with our words. We have an opportunity together to have both strong faith and mighty works within this community. As we grow in our faith and increase our works, we will show the world a more excellent way to live and bear witness to the Lord whom we love and serve.

We will continue to be able to worship in our Sanctuary at 9:30 a.m. every Sunday morning. Thanks be to God! We suggest that everyone wear a mask and respect social distancing.

The Come & See adult class will begin meeting on Sunday mornings at 10:45 – 11:45 on September 19. See the article from our Learning Committee for more specific details. Our plan is to offer these opportunities for all members beginning October 10.

September 12, 2021, is also the Sunday we celebrate the beginning of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church. This church was officially founded on September 11, 1949. On June 16, 2013, Council made the decision to celebrate homecoming every five years on the second Sunday in September. Although this year is not a celebratory year, we remember all of the saints that have gone before us.

As we come together as one every Sunday in celebration, remembrance and expectation for new beginnings, let us give thanks for our many blessings. Let us work together in patience and love for the true purpose for which we gather, the worship of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, and His work in our community and world. Thanks be to God! thanksgiving, receiving the body and blood of Christ. It ALL gave me a true sense of "renewal."

In 2 Timothy, the apostle Paul writes to Timothy from prison knowing that his life is nearing death. He needs to find a successor; someone to carry the torch. Paul encourages Timothy "to stand firm, overcome shame and hold to the faith." He reminds him to "rekindle the gift of God that is within him" and to continue sharing God's word! I feel certain that we, like Timothy, need to hear this same message. Our gifts from God are ignited when we believe and use them for his purposes. He gives us exactly what we need: "a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline."

Rekindling the gift of God within us is not always easy. It can be compared to that of building and keeping a campfire aflame. First, we need the proper materials and technique for stacking the materials. Once it is lit, we must ensure it has the proper air and fuel to keep it burning. We, likewise, need to work constantly on keeping the fire within us burning and trust that God will provide us with what we need.

I invite you to join me and others to recommit yourself for the coming year through the giving of your time, talents and treasures. Recommit yourself to support our yearlong Stewardship campaign by being present in worship, Sunday School and other church activities.

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LECTIONARY FOR SEPTEMBER 2021

SEPTEMBER 5—15TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

James tells us to stop showing favoritism in the assembly, treating the rich visitor with more honor than the poor one. Jesus himself seems to show partiality in his first response to the Syrophoenician woman in today's gospel. Was he testing her faith in saying Gentiles don't deserve the goods meant for God's children? Or was he speaking out of his human worldview, but transcended those limits when she took him by surprise with her reply? Either way, the story tells us that God shows no partiality. Everyone who brings a need to Jesus is received with equal honor as a child and heir.

FIRST READING - Isaiah 35:4-7a

These verses are a word of hope to the exiles in Babylon. Isaiah 34 portrays God's vengeance on Edom, Israel's age-old enemy, which makes the path from Babylon to Zion safe for the exiles' return. The desert itself will flow with water to give drink to the returning exiles.

PSALM - Psalm 146

I will praise the LORD as long as I live. (Ps. 146:2)

SECOND READING - James 2:1-17

Faithful Christians do not show partiality to the rich and powerful of the world, especially at the expense of the poor and weak. Likewise, faith does not pay mere lip service to God's will. Instead, a living Christian faith expresses itself in acts of compassion and mercy for those in need.

GOSPEL - Mark 7:24-37

In Mark's gospel, encounters with women usually signify turning points in Jesus' ministry. Here, a conversation with a Syrophoenician woman marks the beginning of his mission to the Gentiles.

<u>SEPTEMBER 12—16TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST</u>

Three weeks ago we heard Peter's confession of faith as told in John's gospel. This week we hear Mark's version, when Peter says, "You are the Messiah." In John, the stumbling block is Jesus' invitation to eat his flesh, given for the life of the world. In Mark too the scandal has to do with Jesus' words about his own coming death, and here Peter himself stumbles over Jesus' words. But Jesus is anointed (the meaning of *messiah*) in Mark only on the way to the cross (14:3); so we are anointed in baptism with the sign of the cross.

FIRST READING - Isaiah 50:4-9a

The image of the servant of the Lord is one of the notable motifs in the book of Isaiah. Today's reading describes the mission of the servant, whom early Christians associated with Jesus. Like Jesus, the servant does not strike back at his detractors but trusts in God's steadfast love.

PSALM - Psalm 116:1-9

I will walk in the presence of the LORD. (Ps. 116:9)

SECOND READING – James 3:1-12

This text uses various images to illustrate how damaging and hurtful the way we speak to and about others can be. Not only are we to control our speech, but what we say and how we say it are to reflect our faith.

GOSPEL - Mark 8:27-38

This story provides the turning point in Mark's gospel. Peter is the first human being in the narrative to acknowledge Jesus as the Messiah, but he cannot accept that as the Messiah Jesus will have to suffer. Moreover, Jesus issues a strong challenge to all by connecting discipleship and the cross.

SEPTEMBER 19—17TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Today we hear James warn against selfish ambition, while the disciples quarrel over which one of them is the greatest. Jesus tells them the way to be great is to serve. Then, to make it concrete, he puts in front of them a flesh-and-blood child. We are called to welcome the children God puts in front of us, to make room for them in daily interaction, and to give them a place of honor in the assembly.

FIRST READING - Jeremiah 11:18-20

Today's reading tells of the suffering of the prophet Jeremiah, who announced God's word to Judah but was met with intense opposition and persecution. Jeremiah continues to trust in God in the midst of his suffering.

PSALM - Psalm 54

God is my helper; it is the Lord who sustains my life. (Ps. 54:4)

SECOND READING – James 3:13—4:3, 7-8a

The wisdom God gives unites our hearts and minds. Instead of living to satisfy our own wants and desires, we manifest this wisdom in peace, gentleness, mercy, and impartiality toward others.

GOSPEL – Mark 9:30-37

Jesus' teaching and action in this text are directed to the church whenever it is seduced by the world's definition of greatness: prestige, power, influence, and money. The antidote to such a concern for greatness is servanthood.

SEPTEMBER 26—18TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Someone who isn't part of Jesus' own circle is casting out demons in Jesus' name, and the disciples want him stopped. They appeal to Jesus, as Joshua did to Moses about the elders who prophesied without official authorization. Like Moses, Jesus refuses to see this as a threat. Jesus welcomes good being done in his name, even when it is not under his control. The circle we form around Jesus' word must be able to value good being done in ways we wouldn't do it, by people we can't keep tabs on.

FIRST READING - Numbers 11:4-6, 10-16, 24-29

What constitutes legitimate need and legitimate leadership is the focus of this reading. God provides manna in the wilderness, yet the people crave meat. What is truly needful? God bestows the spirit on seventy elders, yet two men not designated as leaders prophesy in the power of God's spirit. What constitutes real leadership?

PSALM - Psalm 19

The commandment of the LORD gives light to the eyes. (Ps. 19:8)

SECOND READING - James 5:13-20

Marks of the Christian community include praying for those who are sick and in need, celebrating with those in good health, restoring those who have strayed, confessing sins to one another, and offering forgiveness to each other.

GOSPEL – Mark 9:38-50

On the way to Jerusalem, Jesus teaches his disciples about ministry that involves service and sacrifice. His disciples are slow to realize that these words apply to them as well as to others. PAGE 11 XLV, ISSUE IX


