A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR



"Let all things be done for building up." 1 Corinthians 14:26b

The Corinthian church was a bit of a mess. Paul helped found the church in the early 50's AD during his second missionary journey (see Acts 18). Paul left them "after a considerable time" of staying in Corinth according to Acts. Others would take over for Paul in leading the church in his absence. Some time later, he received word that the church and its members were having some problems. Among these were quarrels over leaders and authority, lawsuits between church members, dietary disputes, inequity between lower-class and higher-class members, and chaotic worship practices. He wrote his

first letter to the Corinthian church to address these issues.

In Corinth, it seems, some members claimed loyalty to Paul, while others preferred another leader, such as Peter or Apollos. Members dragged their fellow members before secular judges to settle disagreements in court. Some members gleefully ate meat sacrificed to pagan idols, while other members were scandalized by this behavior. Even at their meal, the Lord's Supper, the wealthier and more privileged members gorged themselves and became drunk, while the poorer and less well-connected members went hungry and thirsty. And to top it all off, they had a bad habit of talking over one another in worship and trying to outdo one another in their displays of piety.

As I said, it was a real mess. The troubles of the early Corinthian church make our troubles look mild by comparison, but Paul's advice and encouragement to them is still useful—indeed essential—to us even today. Paul urges the Corinthians to put love for one another ahead of other concerns. He urges them to grow in the Spiritual gifts God has given them. And he implores them to do all things for the building up of the church.

In our upcoming Congregational Retreat, we are focusing on the theme of renewal. This theme is also going to pervade everything we do together this year. God is indeed at work to renew our lives and our life together here. We will work together in the coming year to be renewed in our love for one another, in exploring and strengthening our Spiritual gifts, and in our work together to build up the church.

God has gifted you. God is calling you to use these gifts to renew and build up this congregation. This new year, "let all things be done for building up."

The shipping and receiving team at the VA were so thankful they all came out to help off load the two vehicles full of food. They were especially happy to see the case of "Texas Pete" hot sauce. He said the vets are always looking for that product.

A shout out to the Tollisons, Rod Kent, Daniel at Publix, Leland at the VA and all those who donated to make this effort such a worthwhile endeavor. The Tollisons secured a Thrivent Action Kit and purchased food. Rod Kent helped load, transport, and off load the food. Daniel from Publix at Trenholm Plaza helped select the food and order the items in bulk. Leland, manager of the Food Pantry at the Dorn Veterans Hospital, excitedly welcome us back. While the food pantry receives other donations, Leland likes to see the Good Shepherd donation. He says we really know what the vets like. SOCIAL MINISTRY EMPHASIS JANUARY AND FEBRUARY 2022

The Woodyard Fund is the social ministry emphasis for both January and February at Good Shepherd.

A joint project of The State newspaper and The Salvation Army, the Woodyard Fund helps residents in crisis in Richland, Lexington, Newberry and Fairfield counties pay utilities bills. Applicants are vetted and must meet certain criteria to receive aid.

Eligible households get vouchers redeemable at businesses that provide heating services. The Salvation Army reimburses the businesses for the voucher amounts.

The fund dates to 1816, when the Ladies Benevolent Society provided firewood and coal to families in need in Columbia. In 1930, The State newspaper began publicizing the fund each winter.

Good Shepherd has supported the fund for many years. In 2021 we donated \$1,785 to the fund. If you'd like to support this effort, you may contribute any time during January or February by putting your donation in the offering plate on Sunday mornings, or by sending it to the church office.

Checks should be made to Good Shepherd and designated for The Woodyard Fund.

FOOD PANTRY UPDATE

GSLC's Food Pantry packed and distributed 27 bags of groceries serving 110 individuals in November. Each person that requested groceries also received an additional box of food for Thanksgiving.

LECTIONARY FOR JANUARY 2022

JANUARY 2—SECOND SUNDAY OF CHRISTMAS

Within the gospel reading's profound words lies the simple message that God is revealed in a human person. Though we may try to understand how the Word existed with God from the beginning of time, the wonder we celebrate at Christmas is that the Word continues to dwell among us. Christ comes among us in the gathered assembly, the scriptures, the waters of new birth, and the bread and the wine. Through these ordinary gifts we receive the fullness of God's grace and truth.

FIRST READING - Jeremiah 21:7-14

God promises to bring Israel back to its land from the most remote parts of exile. In Zion Israel will rejoice over God's gift of food and livestock. Young women will express their joy in dancing; God will give gladness instead of sorrow.

PSALM – **Psalm** 147:12-20

Worship the LORD, O Jerusalem; praise your God, O Zion. (Ps. 147:12)

SECOND READING - Ephesians 1:3-14

In Jesus, all of God's plans and purposes have been made know as heaven and earth are united in Christ. Through Jesus, we have been chosen as God's children and have been promised eternal salvation.

GOSPEL - John 1:1-18

John begins his gospel with this prologue: a hymn to the Word through whom all things were created. This Word became flesh and brought grace and truth to the world.

JANUARY 9—BAPTISM OF OUR LORD

Today's festival rejoices in God's blessings. We recall and celebrate our adoption as God's children, the gift of the Holy Spirit, and the promised company of almighty God when we "pass through the waters . . . the rivers . . . fire." On this day the heavens open again for this assembly, and we receive the gift of God's Beloved, Jesus, in bread and wine.

FIRST READING - Isaiah 43:1-7

Near the end of Israel's exile in Babylon, God promises to bring the people home. They need no longer be afraid, because the one who formed, created, and called them by name now redeems them from all their enemies. God declares them precious and honored, and God loves them.

PSALM - Psalm 29

The voice of the LORD is upon the waters. (Ps. 29:3)

SECOND READING - Acts 8:14-17

Peter and John are sent to support the new Christians in Samaria, a group that was recently baptized after hearing the good news of Christ through the preaching of Philip. Here the Samaritans receive the gift of the Holy Spirit in the laying on of hands.

GOSPEL - Luke 3:15-17, 21-22

The reading opens with questions about the identity of the Messiah. John the Baptist insists that he is not the Messiah; instead he points ahead to one who is coming. And whether the voice of God was heard by all or only by Jesus, God settles the matter: Jesus is God's beloved Son.

<u>JANUARY 16—SECOND SUNDAY AFTER EPIPH</u>ANY

The Sundays after Epiphany continue to celebrate the revelation of God's glory to us as it was made known to the magi and to those on Jordan's banks at Jesus' baptismtoday using wedding imagery. Our God rejoices over God's people as those being married rejoice over one another. By the power of the Spirit there are gifts galore for everyone. In Christ Jesus the best wine is saved for last. Taste and see.

FIRST READING - Isaiah 62:1-5

The people's return to Judah after the exile was marred by economic and political troubles. Nevertheless, the prophet declares, Jerusalem and Judah will be restored. God will rejoice over Jerusalem as a bridegroom rejoices over the bride, and the people are called to the celebration.

PSALM - Psalm 36:5-10

We feast upon the abundance of your house, O LORD. (Ps. 36:8)

SECOND READING - 1 Corinthians 12:1-11

The congregation at Corinth experienced division as people were comparing their spiritual gifts, thinking some to be superior to others. Paul invites this fractured community to trust that God's Holy Spirit has gifted them all perfectly for their mission together.

GOSPEL - John 2:1-11

Turning water to wine at the wedding at Cana is described as the first of Jesus' signs. Through many such epiphanies, Jesus reveals that he bears God's creative power and joyful presence into the world.

JANUARY 23—THIRD SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY

God's glory is revealed in the reading of scripture. People stand at attention. People weep. People prostrate themselves in prayer. The unity of the church is another reflection of God's glory. Most gloriously, the promises of God are fulfilled in the person of Jesus Christ. Gather round. Listen up. Glimpse the glory of God.

FIRST READING - Nehemiah 8:1-3, 5-6, 8-10

The exiles have returned and rebuilt Jerusalem. Now Ezra, the priest, reads the law of Moses to them in the public square. When they hear it, they weep for their sins and for the long years in exile, but Ezra reminds them that "the joy of the LORD is your strength."

PSALM - Psalm 19

The teaching of the LORD revives the soul. (Ps. 19:7)

SECOND READING - 1 Corinthians 12:12-31a

The apostle and pastor Paul uses the metaphor of the human body to describe how intimately connected we are in the church. For this struggling congregation in Corinth, Paul delivers a vital message of unity that is a mark of the church today.

GOSPEL - Luke 4:14-21

Near the beginning of Jesus' public ministry, he visits his hometown of Nazareth. In the words of Isaiah, he states and claims his identity, purpose, and mission.

JANUARY 30—FOURTH SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY

The glory of God is often revealed when and where it is least expected. God uses our lips to declare that glory, inexperienced and hesitant though they may be. God uses our love to demonstrate that glory and so urges us to exercise it. God uses Jesus of Nazareth, water and the word, bread and wine, to reveal God's glory where and when God chooses. Take heed, lest the glory of God slip through our midst unnoticed.

FIRST READING - Jeremiah 1:4-10

God calls Jeremiah to be a prophet and consecrates him in the womb. Jeremiah's task is to preach God's word amid the difficult political realities of his time, before the Babylonian exile. He is to make God known not only to Judah, but also to the nations.

PSALM - Psalm 71:1-6

From my mother's womb you have been my strength. (Ps. 71:6)

SECOND READING - 1 Corinthians 13:1-13

Christians in Corinth prided themselves on their spiritual gifts. Paul reminds them that God gives us many gifts through the Holy Spirit, but the purpose behind all of them is love, the kind of love that God showed us in Jesus Christ.

GOSPEL - Luke 4:21-30

People in Jesus' hometown are initially pleased when he says that God will free the oppressed. Their pleasure turns to rage when he reminds them that God's prophetic mission typically pushes beyond human boundaries so that mercy and healing are extended to those regarded as outsiders.


