A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

Dear Good Shepherd family,

Last month I wrote to you about a passage from 1 Corinthians, encouraging us to allow all things to be done for the building up of the church. Indeed, that key word "build" is a theme that will come up again and again this year. It goes hand in hand with our theme of renewal for the retreat coming up later this month. In our recent Council retreat I spoke to the council about my hopes and plans to help build the church this coming year. I sense that our leaders share my excitement and optimism about our future

together. They are ready to help us build in new ways, which is a wonderful blessing.

When we hear the term "build" we may think of different, yet related things. Some of you were here when this congregation embarked on various building campaigns to expand our facilities. Whether that was the education building, the FAB, the new sanctuary, the roof project, or some other building campaign, we know what it is like to expand and grow our physical resources in this way. Likewise, some of you were part of a building process at Good Shepherd years ago when the emphasis was on building up of the attendance numbers. You saw first-hand the joys that can come when God gathers new people into a place for a specific time and purpose. I am certain that these times of growth—both the physical and the numerical—were also connected with a time of spiritual growth. And that is the type of growth that I believe God is primarily calling us to at this time.

It is wonderful to grow outward physically—to acquire land, move soil, and add facilities. It is fantastic to grow outward socially—to invite new people and experience an increase in numbers. But neither of these things will be complete without growth both downward and upward. We need to grow downward—to have a healthy root system firmly connected to the Word of God. We must be nourished for this growth by our worship, learning, service, and fellowship together. We are strengthened and fertilized by the Sacraments and the Word of God. And as below, so above—as we grow deeper in our faith together, we grow upwards—closer to God and one another. A strong root system means good fruit is likely to be brought forth. Just as it is for plants that grow, so it is for people of faith.

Yet this process doesn't just happen. Such growth, such expansion must be encouraged and cultivated. That is why the word "build" will be so vital this year. This is an active verb. We work together toward this goal of growing downward and upward—of building a firm foundation and building to new heights together. Just as a full crop cannot come forth without tilling and working, so we will not reach our fullness without the work of the Holy Spirit and without our own willingness to work together. Throughout the New Testament, we hear the twin refrain: "build yourselves up" and "be built up." We are not passive observers of God's work, nor are we "lone rangers" who build by our own strength alone. Rather, we are participants together with God in this work and ministry.

Are you ready to grow and build together? Do you want a deeper root system; a firmer foundation? Would you like to grow to new heights together? If so, come and worship in person and/or online. Come and learn in one of our Bible studies and in Sunday school. Participate in a committee and in our fellowship and social events. Serve with your time and money through our Social Ministry opportunities and programs. Give more faithfully and more fully to the mission we share. As we do this work together, we send down new and deeper roots and we put forth new shoots and leaves, growing toward the fullness God has in store for us. So let us build and be built this year together. God will give this growth and to God be the glory.

SOCIAL MINISTRY EMPHASIS

The Woodyard Fund will continue to be the Social Ministry emphasis during the month of February at Good Shepherd.

A joint project of The State newspaper and The Salvation Army, the Woodyard Fund helps residents in crisis in Richland, Lexington, Newberry and Fairfield counties pay utilities bills. Applicants are vetted and must meet certain criteria to receive aid.

Eligible households get vouchers redeemable at businesses that provide heating services. The Salvation Army reimburses the businesses for the voucher amounts.

The fund dates to 1816, when the Ladies Benevolent Society provided firewood and coal to families in need in Columbia. In 1930, The State newspaper began publicizing the fund each winter.

Good Shepherd has supported the fund for many years. In 2021 we donated \$1,785 to the fund. If you'd like to support this effort, you may contribute any time during January or February by putting your donation in the offering plate on Sunday mornings, or by sending it to the church office.

Checks should be made to Good Shepherd and designated for The Woodyard Fund.

LECTIONARY FOR FEBRUARY 2022

FEBRUARY 6—FIFTH SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY

The fifth Sunday after Epiphany continues to highlight unlikely instruments and circumstances appointed to reveal God's glory. "Who will go for us?" God asks. A person of unclean lips, a former persecutor of the church of God, and three fishermen who couldn't catch a thing. More surprising still, perhaps, is that we are also called.

FIRST READING - Isaiah 6:1-13

Through a vision in the temple, the eighth-century prophet Isaiah is called by God to announce judgment against Israel. Aware of his sinfulness and shortcomings, Isaiah is initially hesitant. But when God calls, Isaiah responds, "Here am I; send me!"

PSALM – Psalm 138

I will bow down toward your holy temple. (Ps. 138:2)

SECOND READING – 1 Corinthians 15:1-11

Paul delivers in a nutshell the story of the gospel that was given to him. In the lineage of the Christian faith, we have received the good news of God's love from generations of believers before us, and we continue to tell this story to the world.

GOSPEL - Luke 5:1-11

Jesus' teaching of God's word has begun to draw great crowds. For Simon, James, and John, Jesus' teaching inspires hospitality, then obedience, and then risk. After Jesus' creative power is revealed, fear and amazement leads these three fishermen to leave everything behind to become apostles.

FEBRUARY 13—SIXTH SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY

Blessings and curses abound on the sixth Sunday after Epiphany. We would do well to listen closely to whom the "blessed ares" and the "woe tos" are directed and to find our place in the crowd among those who desire to touch Jesus. The risen Christ stands among us in the mystery of the holy supper with an invitation to live in him, and offers power to heal us all.

FIRST READING - Jeremiah 17:5-10

These verses compose a poem that is part of a larger collection of wisdom sayings that contrast two ways of life. Life with God brings blessing; the power and vitality of God is active in our life. Life without God brings a curse, the power of death.

PSALM - Psalm 1

They are like trees planted by streams of water. (Ps. 1:3)

SECOND READING - 1 Corinthians 15:12-20

For Paul, the resurrection of Christ is the basis for Christian hope. Because Christ has been raised, those who are in Christ know that they too will be raised to a new life beyond death.

GOSPEL - Luke 6:17-26

After choosing his twelve apostles, Jesus teaches a crowd of followers about the nature and demands of discipleship. He begins his great sermon with surprising statements about who is truly blessed in the eyes of God.

<u>FEBRUARY 20—SEVENTH SUNDAY AFTER</u> <u>EPIPHANY</u>

Mercy. Mercy. Mercy. Joseph lives it in Egypt. Jesus preaches it in the gospel. The Spirit guides us into merciful lives with the power of forgiveness to reconcile what is fractured and divided. Such merciful living is the baptismal blessing of having put on Christ. It is the gift of the life-giving Spirit. It is a reflection of God's glory revealed in Christ.

FIRST READING - Genesis 45:3-11, 15

Many years after being sold into slavery by his jealous brothers, Joseph reveals himself to them. Now the second-in-command in Egypt, Joseph reassures his brothers that God has used their evil intentions for good to preserve life during a devastating famine, and Joseph forgives them.

PSALM - Psalm 37:1-11, 39-40

The lowly shall possess the land; they will delight in abundance of peace. (Ps. 37:11)

SECOND READING – 1 Corinthians 15:35-38, 42-50 In the Apostles' Creed, we speak of the "resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting." Using the metaphor of a planted seed and the story of Adam, Paul preaches passionately about the mystery of following Christ's perfect life into eternity.

GOSPEL - Luke 6:27-38

Jesus continues to address a crowd of his disciples. He invites his followers to shower radical love, blessing, forgiveness, generosity, and trust even on enemies and outsiders. Living in harmony with God's intent brings the reward of overflowing blessing.

FEBRUARY 27—TRANSFIGURATION OF OUR LORD Witnesses to the glory of God in the face of Jesus reflect that glory in the world. It was true for Moses. It was doubtless true for Peter, James, and John. We pray that it will be true of all of us who see God's glory in the word and in the supper and who are being "transformed into the same image" by God's Spirit.

FIRST READING - Exodus 34:29-35

Moses' face shone with the reflected glory of God after he received the Ten Commandments on Mount Sinai. The sight caused the Israelites to be afraid, so Moses wore a veil to mask the radiance of God's glory, taking it off when he spoke directly with God.

PSALM - Psalm 99

Proclaim the greatness of the LORD; worship upon God's holy hill. (Ps. 99:9)

SECOND READING – 2 Corinthians 3:12--4:2

In his debates with the Corinthians, Paul contrasts the glory of Moses with the glory of Christ. The Israelites could not see Moses' face because of the veil. But in Christ we see the unveiled glory of God and are transformed into Christ's likeness.

GOSPEL - Luke 9:28-43a

The conversation about Jesus' suffering and death is enclosed in a dazzling foreshadowing of the resurrection. God affirms Jesus' identity, the disciples are stunned speechless, and Jesus resumes his mission with a demonstration of his power over evil.


