A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR



My dear Good Shepherd family,

We are rapidly approaching one of my favorite times of the church year. You may think I'm writing about Easter, and I certainly love Easter. Or perhaps you think I'm writing about Holy Week, and I do love Holy Week. In fact, I'm writing about both. I love the transition from death to life that the journey of Lent, Holy Week and Easter helps guide us through as God's people. The joy of Easter is made more radiant by the sorrow of Good Friday. When I was growing up at St. John's in Spartanburg my family always

made a habit of going to worship on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday in addition to our custom of attending Easter worship. (In fact, when I was a child our pastor held worship every single night of Holy Week!) On Good Friday, we always closed with a solo rendition of *Were You There*. It did, in fact, sometimes cause me to tremble. The haunting thought of Jesus' crucifixion was underscored not just by the somber singing, but also by the stark nakedness of the altar and pulpit and the dim lights, nearly fully extinguished.

Yet on Easter Sunday morning, the sanctuary was bright and radiant. The altar and pulpit were adorned with white paraments. The sweet fragrance of lilies filled the air. Each Easter morning, we would always begin worship with the joyful tune *Christ is Risen! Alleluia!* And again, it was the contrast with the sorrow of Good Friday that made this so meaningful. Consider the third verse of this hymn:

Christ is risen! All the sorrow that last evening round him lay now has found a glorious morrow in the rising of today.

See the grave its firstfruits giving, springing up from holy ground; Christ was dead, but now is living; he was lost, but he is found.

The hope and joy of Easter for us as God's people is not just the idea that our God is living, but that our God died *and* rose again. Christ endured death for us. Death is one of the common experiences of human life and Christ came to share that with us. Yet he also defeated death and he now lives forever, that we might live with him, now and forever.

Perhaps the real beauty of this time of year to me is found in that contrast—death and life, pain and beauty, darkness and light, grave clothes and resurrection garments. The beauty is that Christ walked with us through life and through death and back again. The beauty is that when death draws near, Christ is with us, always ready to give us the gift of new life and resurrection.


We will all experience the full spectrum of human experiences in our lives. No matter what happens to us or what we are going through, Christ is there with us, calling us out of sorrow into joy; out of death into life. When we mourn what seems to have passed away, we are met with comfort from our risen Lord and with assurances that he is indeed making all things new. I believe we are now entering such a season of renewal together. Though we may have a sense of pain and loss at times, we are also met by our Lord who is raising us up just as he was raised. Take heart and give thanks to the crucified and risen one, Jesus Christ our Lord.

The recipients of this year's Lenten Self-Denial Offerings will be the BackPack Programs at Conder Elementary School, Forest Lake Elementary School, and Bradley Elementary School.



Many children only eat at school, and dread going home for the weekend when they know they will be hungry. BackPack programs operate during the school year and provide children who are at risk of hunger with healthy, nutritious food to take home for the weekend, during school vacations, and on holidays.

Backpacks or other containers are stocked with nutritious, child-friendly and easy to prepare food. They are distributed discreetly on Fridays or the last day children attend school for the week. In collaboration with Harvest Hope Food Bank and other charities, schools strive to fill each child's backpack with enough food for dinner on Friday and breakfast, lunch, dinner and snacks on both Saturday and Sunday.

GOOD SHEPHERD FOUNDATION

The Good Shepherd Foundation was created to assist the Church in carrying out its religious, charitable, educational and other tax exempt missions. The Foundation accomplishes its purpose by collecting contributions, donations and bequests, investing Foundation assets and then making distributions in the form of grants to appropriate persons and organizations as defined by Foundation policies.

The grants made by the Foundation should be supported by an active member of Good Shepherd Church, a "Congregational Shepherd." The Congregational Shepherd should have knowledge of the proposed project and be able to ensure that grants are used appropriately. In accordance with the operating policies of the Foundation, grants may be awarded in the following four areas:

- Grants for outreach to the community, including institutions and agencies that have common goals as Good Shepherd Church. Programs should target those in our community that have spiritual and/or economic need.
- Grants to agencies of the South Carolina Synod of the ELCA for missions at home and abroad.
- Grants to members of Good Shepherd Church for Christian education and training.
- Grants for non-budgeted projects of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church.

Grants are awarded twice yearly. Deadlines for applications are May 1 and November 1. Awards are made shortly after deadline dates. Total grant funds may be limited; individual grants are currently limited to \$2,000.

Applications are available on the table in the Chapel area. Applications should be returned to the church office in a sealed envelope

LECTIONARY FOR APRIL 2022

APRIL 3—FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT

Our God makes all things new. In the first reading God promises it. In the gospel Mary anticipates it, anointing Jesus' feet with costly perfume in preparation for the day of his burial. In the second reading Paul recalls his transformation from the persecutor Saul into an apostle. In baptism, God's new person (you!) rises daily from the deadly mire of trespasses and sins.

FIRST READING - Isaiah 43:16-21

The prophet declares that long ago God performed mighty deeds and delivered Israel from Egyptian bondage through the waters of the sea. Now, God is about to do a new thing, bringing the exiles out of Babylon and through the wilderness in a new Exodus.

PSALM – Psalm 126

Those who sowed with tears will reap with songs of joy. (Ps. 126:5)

SECOND READING - Philippians 3:4b-14

Writing to Christians in Philippi, Paul admits that his heritage and reputation could give him more reason than most people to place confidence in his spiritual pedigree. But the overwhelming grace of God in Jesus calls Paul to a new set of values.

GOSPEL - John 12:1-8

Judas willfully misinterprets as waste Mary's extravagant act of anointing Jesus' feet with costly perfume. Jesus recognizes that her lavish gift is both an expression of love and an anticipation of his burial.

APRIL 10—PALM SUNDAY

Today we follow Christ from triumphal entry to the cross, each waypoint of the journey marked by Jesus' compassion for those who would betray, mock, accuse, or do violence to him. Though persecuted and beaten, Jesus the Son of God is not disgraced; instead, he asks forgiveness for those who put him to death. We have walked the Lenten pathway these forty days, each of us invited through baptism to "let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus." We enter this holy week accompanying Jesus to the cross with both grief and thanksgiving in our hearts, trusting in God's redeeming love.

FIRST READING - Isaiah 50:4-9a

This text, the third of the four Servant Songs in Isaiah, speaks of the servant's obedience amid persecution. Though the servant has been variously understood as the prophet himself or a remnant of faithful Israel, Christians have often recognized the figure of Christ in these poems.

PSALM – Psalm 31:9-16

Into your hands, O LORD, I commend my spirit. (Ps. 31:5)

SECOND READING - Philippians 2:5-11

Paul quotes from an early Christian hymn that describes Jesus' humble obedience in his incarnation as a human being, even to death, and his exaltation and glory as Lord of all.

GOSPEL - Luke 22:14-23:56

Through the teachings and events of the passion story we see and hear the great contradictions that

characterize the coming of God's reign. The leader serves the followers, proud Peter is revealed in his cowardice, and Jesus—the innocent bringer of life—is arrested, beaten, executed, and buried.

<u>APRIL 17—RESURRECTION OF OUR LORD: EASTER</u> DAY

The last enemy to be destroyed is death," Paul writes. Today Christ is risen, and we gather together with astonishment and joy. Christ is risen, and we have been set free from the bonds of death. Christ is risen, and we are forgiven. Christ is risen, and with the women at the tomb and Peter, we are amazed. Let us rejoice: Christ is risen indeed! Alleluia!

FIRST READING - Acts 10:34-43

Peter's sermon, delivered at the home of Cornelius, a Roman army officer, is a summary of the essential message of Christianity: Everyone who believes in Jesus, whose life, death, and resurrection fulfilled the words of the prophets, receives forgiveness of sins through his name.

PSALM - Psalm 118:1-2, 14-24

This is the day that the LORD has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it. (Ps. 118:24)

SECOND READING - 1 Corinthians 15:19-26

Paul describes the consequences of the resurrection, including the promise of new life in Christ to a world that has been in bondage to death. He celebrates the destruction of evil and the establishment of God's victorious rule over all.

GOSPEL – Luke 24:1-12

Evidently expecting to find Jesus' corpse, some of the women among his followers go to the tomb with embalming spices. After a perplexing encounter with the empty tomb and angelic visitors, the women become the first to proclaim the amazing news of resurrection.

APRIL 24—SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER

In spite of all we have heard and all we have seen, it is often hard to believe. Because it is hard to believe, we will invest ourselves in the Easter mystery for fifty days (a week of weeks). Because it is hard to believe, John the evangelist will provide sign after sign celebrating Jesus' victory over death. Because it is hard to believe, the risen Jesus will return to us again and again in the mystery of holy communion, inviting us to touch and taste his presence, and offering us his peace.

FIRST READING - Acts 5:27-32

Peter has been arrested for proclaiming the good news of Jesus' death and resurrection. His response to the charges of the high priest summarizes the early church's proclamation of forgiveness of sin through repentance.

PSALM - Psalm 118:14-29

You are my God, and I will exalt you. (Ps. 118:28)

SECOND READING - Revelation 1:4-8

The book of Revelation recounts a mystical vision of the risen Christ experienced by a Christian prophet named John. Here he describes Christ as a timeless redeemer, the beginning, present, and end of all time.

GOSPEL - John 20:19-31

The unprecedented events of the day of resurrection continue as the risen Jesus appears to his fearful disciples. A week later, after Thomas worships Jesus, Jesus pronounces that the blessings of the resurrection are also for those who "have not seen and yet believe."
