A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR



Although the eggs have now all been hidden and (hopefully) found; although the candy is gone or nearly gone; although the decorations may have been packed away, we remain in the season of Easter. Easter is both a day—the day of the Resurrection of our Lord—and a 50-day season of the church. The season of Easter is a time for discerning new possibilities. The Resurrection of Christ has changed everything, we proclaim. This season of Easter is one of the times we are challenged to live out that truth.

Our scripture readings during the Easter season help us to focus on new possibilities. Consider, for instance, our First Readings during worship. While most of the church year these are Old Testament readings, during Easter we have readings from the book of Acts instead. There we hear some stories from the early church's struggle to discern how to continue Jesus' movement and ministry in a faithful way. In Acts over the next few weeks we will hear about Saul's (Paul's) "murderous threats" against the church, as well as Saul's miraculous conversion on the Damascus Road, after which he began to praise Jesus rather than to persecute the body of Christ. Talk about a new possibility! My favorite part of that story is that the members of the early church were not eager to accept Saul for obvious reasons, but God moved them to incorporate him into the body anyway.

We'll read about the death (and resuscitation) of a young woman named Tabitha (Dorcas). There we see the early church struggling to figure out what to do when Jesus' expected second coming hadn't come quite as soon as they had all expected. How would they carry on once members of the church began to die before the Lord's return? What would the life of Jesus mean in light of the death of beloved sisters and brothers in the church?

We'll even read about an argument between Peter and some other leaders in the church about allowing Gentiles to become part of the community of faith that gathered in Jesus' name—likely a possibility that the exclusively Jewish members never fathomed at first. Yet they discerned that God was indeed moving to allow even other nations and peoples to be drawn into the love of Jesus.

In our Second Readings during worship we'll hear words from Revelation—assurances that despite the sufferings and hardships the church may endure, Jesus will vindicate those who are faithful and Jesus will live and reign forever. Where the world seems to offer impossible odds and difficult situations, God offers a new possibility: Life forever with Jesus.

So I urge you to come and hear and ponder these stories with me. And more than that, I invite you to discern with me the new possibilities God is giving us here and now. We'll talk about this in worship together, also. May this Easter season bring new and life-giving possibilities just as that first Easter season did.

In 1991, The Women's Shelter formed a separate, private nonprofit organization from the Providence Home, in order to carry out a comprehensive ministry specific to homeless women. The changing needs of homeless women have required The Women's Shelter to adapt its programs over the years. They strive to offer more than a bed and something to eat as a means to provide lasting change in the lives of their residents. The Women's Shelter offers a variety of educational and support programs to women and families in need.



NOISY OFFERING



The May Noisy Offering will support Happy Wheels. One day, each week throughout the year, Happy Wheels volunteers visit each inpatient room of the 3 children's hospitals in South Carolina with a decorated surgical cart filled with brand new books and toys. Each child gets to pick out one toy/book of their choice every week for the duration of their admission and take these items with them when they go home. Happy Wheels visits approximately 400 children weekly. All noisy offering money collected on Sunday, May 29 will help Happy Wheels keep their carts stocked with toys and books.



LECTIONARY FOR MAY 2022

MAY 1—THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER

The disciples make a big splash and eat breakfast with the risen Jesus. Wading in the water (remembering baptism) and eating with Jesus (celebrating holy communion) is our weekly encounter with the risen Christ. Jesus asks us again and again: Do you love me? And Jesus invites us, again and again, to follow him, bringing the Easter life to others.

FIRST READING - Acts 9:1-20

Saul (later called Paul) was an ardent persecutor of all who followed the Way of Christ. This reading recounts the story of his transformation beginning with an encounter with Jesus Christ on the way to Damascus.

PSALM - Psalm 30

You have turned my wailing into dancing. (Ps. 30:11)

SECOND READING - Revelations 5:11-14

The vision of John recorded in Revelation offers a glimpse of cosmic worship around the throne. At its center is "the Lamb who was slain."

GOSPEL - John 21:1-19

The risen Christ appears again to his disciples by the sea where they were first called. After echoes of the fishing and feeding miracles, he gives a final reminder of the cost of a disciple's love and obedience.

MAY 8—FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

The gift of new life, of eternal life, is the gift of the risen Christ. It is the promise of Jesus. It was true for Dorcas in Joppa. It was true for those "who have come out of the great ordeal" in the Revelation vision. It is true for us and for all the baptized: Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever.

FIRST READING - Acts 9:36-43

Dorcas was a faithful and devoted woman of charity in the community of Joppa. Her kindness and her work with clothing were well-known, especially to the widows in town. When she fell ill and died, Peter raised her back to life through the power of prayer.

PSALM - Psalm 23

The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not be in want. (Ps. 23:1)

SECOND READING – Revelation 7:9-17

Christ is the shepherd who leads his faithful to springs of the water of life. Christ is also the lamb who vanquishes sin and suffering.

GOSPEL - John 10:22-30

Jesus responds to questions about his identity with the remarkable claim that he and the Father are one. Those who understand this are his sheep; they hear his voice, follow, and will never be snatched from his hand.

MAY 15—FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Easter initiates a new day. It anticipates a new heaven and a new earth. The risen Christ is making all things new. In the mystery of holy baptism God has made new people of us. Today Jesus invites us to see everyone in a new light—through the lens of love.

FIRST READING - Acts 11:1-18

In defense of his earlier baptism of non-Jewish believers, Peter demonstrates to the members of the Jerusalem church that God's intention to love Gentiles as well as Jews is revealed in Jesus' testimony. In this way the mission to the Gentiles is officially authorized.

PSALM - Psalm 148

The splendor of the LORD is over earth and heaven. (Ps. 148:13) **SECOND READING – Revelation 21:1-6**

John's vision shows us that in the resurrection the new age has dawned; God dwells with us already. Yet we wait for the time when the tears that cloud our vision will be wiped away. Then we will see the new heaven, new earth, and new Jerusalem.

GOSPEL - John 13:31-35

After washing the disciples' feet, predicting his betrayal, and then revealing his betrayer, Jesus speaks of his glorification on the cross. This deep complicated love of Jesus, even to death on the cross, will be the distinctive mark of Jesus' community.

MAY 22—SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Visions abound in the readings for the sixth Sunday of Easter. Paul has a vision about what to do. John has a vision of what will be. Jesus provides visions of peace that surpasses human understanding and power beyond human imagination.

FIRST READING - Acts 16:9-15

A vision compels Paul to move his ministry into Greece. There he meets Lydia, an important person in the business community, whose heart has been opened by God to receive the gospel. Her conversion and baptism provide the impetus for the founding of the church at Philippi.

PSALM - Psalm 67

Let the nations be glad and sing for joy. (Ps. 67:4)

SECOND READING - Revelation 21:10, 22—22:5

John's vision of a new Jerusalem coming out of heaven provides continuity with God's past actions. Yet in this new city, God's presence replaces the temple, and the glory of God and the Lamb supplants sun and moon.

GOSPEL - John 5:1-9

As Jesus talks of returning to the Father, he promises to send the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, who will teach Jesus' followers and remind them of all that Jesus taught. Even more, those in whom God makes a home will experience a peace that overcomes fear.

MAY 29—SEVENTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

It is possible to hear in Jesus' high priestly prayer, a prayer he offered shortly before his death, the petitions of the ascended Christ for his own throughout history—to our day—and beyond. Jesus prays for us. In holy baptism we become believers in God, have our robes washed in the flood of Christ's forgiveness, and receive the gift of life forever with all the saints.

FIRST READING - Acts 16:16-34

Those who had enslaved a girl and used her powers to tell fortunes threw Paul and Silas into jail for ordering the spirit to come out of her and consequently ruining their business. In prison, Paul and Silas bring the good news of the gospel to the jailer and his family.

PSALM - Psalm 97

Rejoice in the LORD, you righteous. (Ps. 97:12)

SECOND READING - Revelation 22:12-14, 16-17, 20-21

The ascended Christ, hidden from our sight, promises to come again. We eagerly pray, "Come, Lord Jesus," with all who respond to this invitation.

GOSPEL - John 17:20-26

Jesus prays that the life of his followers will be characterized by an intimate unity of identity with God. To be so identified with God means also to share in God's mission: to proclaim the word that will bring others into this same unity.
