

A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR



Two of my friends in high school were terrific runners. One was a sprinter on the track team. The other was a distance runner on the cross-country team. There was a sort of friendly rivalry between them, but it was hard to have a true contest or to judge which of them was the "faster" because sprinting and distance running have so little in common. Indeed, some people are very quick in short bursts and others are better at pacing themselves over the long haul. Some are sprinters, others are distance runners. I can assure you that I am neither.

But this same comparison of sprinting versus distance running can be applied as a metaphor for our life of discipleship. In our church year, there are certain seasons that feel like sprints. Advent and Christmas, for instance. Lent and the Easter season also come to mind. They are times of intense focus and a rapid pace.

Yet we also have seasons like the one we are about to enter—the Time after Pentecost. The liturgical color for this season is green. My pastor when I was growing up always called this time of year "the long, green growing season of the church." It is a marathon, not a sprint. We have to pace ourselves. We have to be very intentional about our actions and our participation in the life of discipleship and the ministry of the church. If we try to enter this Time after Pentecost as if it is a sprint, we may soon run out of energy and fall away.

Or worse yet, we quit before we even start. It can be tempting to treat this time of year as if it is a time to lay back and rest. Sometimes we need a breather. But as any good distance runner would tell you, you have to keep putting one foot in front of the other. You don't necessarily need to always go at breakneck speed, but you have to keep moving or you will never reach your goal.

I know that during this summer season and the remainder of the Time after Pentecost it can be easy to fall back from your church commitments. It can be tempting to stop your race of faith entirely. But I urge you, keep running the race. Continue to worship, participate in ministries of the church, study Scripture, and support the church financially during this time.

This is, as I said, a growing season. That growth may not always be exponential. Sometimes it may in fact be incremental. But this is a time for growth; a time for moving forward and pressing on toward the goal of life with God. I urge you to keep up the pace. Like a weary runner being doused with cool water, come here regularly and be refreshed by the waters of your baptism. Like a wise runner carefully choosing the right fuel before a run, come here regularly to be nourished for your race of faith at the Communion table. Like a disciplined runner committed to victory, continue to give your all. That means giving your time and talents and treasure to this work of ministry that we share.

Yes, the "big seasons" for giving and church involvement may be the sprinting seasons—Lent, Easter, Advent, Christmas, and so on. But now is the time and now is the season for us to run the distance together as we grow into the fullness that God is calling us to be. We're just hitting our stride; don't stop now.

Hear Ye, Hear Ye!

Anyone who is currently a tabulator or who would like to explore the possibility of joining our team, please be advised that we will have refresher training on June 9 at 5:00 p.m. in Classroom 2. Please let Becky Shealy know if you will **not** be able to

attend and she will schedule your refresher course. Becky is in the process of making a detailed notebook that will highlight the procedures we need to use when counting the weekly offerings. This notebook will be found in the tabulator's room for anyone interested in looking it over before deciding whether to join the team or not. We currently have 11 people dedicated to this ministry. It would be nice to be able to add 4 or 5 more. At present tabulators count about once every five weeks. We try and make the schedule at least one and possibly two months ahead so people can plan their tabulating times. It is a very flexible group with people willing to swap dates if a conflict arises. 
WHAT IS FUN FRIDAYS?

LECTIONARY FOR JUNE 2022

JUNE 5—DAY OF PENTECOST

On Pentecost, we celebrate that we have been given an Advocate to accompany us. Poured out in wind and fire, water, wine, and bread, the Holy Spirit abides in and among us. We give thanks that God speaks to each of us, no matter our origins, language, or life path. Filled with the Spirit of truth, we go out from worship to proclaim the saving power of Christ's love and the freedom of God's grace with all the world.

FIRST READING - Acts 2:1-21

Before Jesus ascended into heaven, he told his disciples they would be filled with the Holy Spirit. Now, amid signs of fire, wind, and a variety of languages, the people were amazed and astonished at Jesus' promise coming true.

PSALM - Psalm 104:24-34, 35b

Send forth your Spirit and renew the face of the earth. (Ps. 104:30)

SECOND READING - Romans 8:14-17

Here Paul speaks about the mystery of baptism: through the Holy Spirit we are claimed, gathered, and welcomed into Christ's body, the church. And we receive a new name in our adoption: child of God.

GOSPEL - John 14:8-27

Though the disciples struggle with Jesus' nature and identity, they receive the promise that they too will be identified with God and God's mission. Though he must leave them now, Jesus promises the coming of the Advocate whom God will send to comfort and enlighten them.

JUNE 12—THE HOLY TRINITY

"O LORD our Lord, how majestic is your name in all the earth!" Today we celebrate the holy Trinity. Paul writes that through Jesus we have peace with God, whose love pours into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, giving us lasting hope. We celebrate the gracious One-in-Three, eternal Three-in-One, as we worship in community; as we share water and word, bread and wine; and as we bring God's love and hope to our neighbors.

FIRST READING - Proverbs 8:1-4, 22-31

In the Bible, wisdom is portrayed in terms sometimes human and sometimes divine. Often, wisdom is personified as feminine. In this passage, Woman Wisdom is depicted not only as the first creation of God, but also as God's helper, rejoicing in God's creation, especially in human beings.

PSALM - Psalm 8

Your glory is chanted above the heavens. (Ps. 8:2) **SECOND READING – Romans 5:1-5**

Paul describes the life of faith with reference to God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit. Even now, we have peace with God through Jesus, and our hope for the future is grounded in the love of God that we experience through Christ's Holy Spirit.

GOSPEL - John 16:12-15

Jesus' ongoing presence with the disciples will be made known through the coming Spirit who will guide them and communicate to them Jesus' will and glory.

JUNE 19—2ND SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

This Sunday's texts paint startling pictures of the horrific nature of sin. The church's repeated celebration of holy communion counters that tragic reality in a continued showing forth of the death of Jesus until he comes again. It is a dramatic declaration of "how much God has done for you."

FIRST READING - Isaiah 65:1-9

The prophet announces God's impatience. The people's self-absorption is idolatry, and images of practices that displease God fill this reading. Like a vintner who crushes the grape to release the wine, God will use Israel's exile to establish a new community of the faithful.

PSALM - Psalm 22:19-28

In the midst of the assembly I will praise you. (Ps. 22:22)

SECOND READING - Galatians 3:23-29

For Paul, baptism is a powerful bond that unites people not only with God but with other believers. Those who call themselves children of God experience a transformation that removes prejudices of race, social class, or gender in favor of true unity in Christ.

GOSPEL – Luke 8:26-39

Jesus' mission includes foreigners and his authority extends to the casting out of demons. Some who witness Jesus' work are seized with confusion and fear, but the man who was healed is commissioned to give testimony to God's mercy and power.

JUNE 26— 3RD SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

We have no good apart from God. That makes Jesus' call to follow him an invitation to freedom. This is freedom to revel in the Spirit's fruit: love, joy, peace, and patience. This is freedom to not be imprisoned by anything that would keep us from the fullness of the life God has given us. This is the path of life.

FIRST READING - 1 Kings 19:15-16, 19-21

In the story preceding today's reading, the prophet Elijah flees for his life to the security of God's mountain. There God reveals to Elijah that there are still other faithful people in Israel and commissions him to anoint new leaders, including his own successor. Elisha.

PSALM - Psalm 16

I have set the LORD always before me. (Ps. 16:8)

SECOND READING - Galatians 5:1, 13-25

For Paul, the freedom Christ gives is not permission to do whatever we want. It is the invitation to be what we could not be otherwise. The power and guidance of Christ's Holy Spirit produce a different kind of life, one marked by the fruit of this Holy Spirit.

GOSPEL – Luke 9:51-62

Jesus is unwavering in his commitment to his mission in Jerusalem and will not be swayed by pettiness. In a series of striking cases in point, he calls his disciples to a similar singlemindedness. PAGE 15 XLVI, ISSUE VI


