## GraceWorks—Restore

July 11 - 14 The GraceWorks Leadership Team is incredibly excited for the 9<sup>th</sup> annual GraceWorks Youth Servant Camp here in the Midlands!



Here's some key information for congregations, adult volunteers, youth, and parents.

**What is GraceWorks?** GraceWorks is a local servant camp for Midlands Youth who are rising 6<sup>th</sup> graders through recently graduated 12<sup>th</sup> graders. It's also a camp for adult volunteers who want to support and encourage these young people in Christ-like service. GraceWorks develops servant leaders as these youth serve various agencies around the Columbia area. Most of these agencies serve vulnerable children or adults. In addition to doing physical labor like painting, cleaning, yard work, and organizing, youth also learn about the ministry of these agencies and often have opportunities to interact with those they are serving. GraceWorks also accepts adult volunteers to help out during the week. If you are interested the registration link is the same for the youth.

What does it cost: This year's cost will be \$50\* per youth, this covers supplies, snacks, and our recreation day for all our participants. --- \*This cost will be covered by the GSLC Youth Summer Missions fund. Please let Amy Kemp know you are attending so she can look for your invoice to pay the registration fee. There is not a fee for adult volunteers.

Where is GraceWorks this year? Ebenezer Lutheran Church, 1301 Richland Street, Columbia, 29201. This will be our home base, most of our service experiences will involve traveling offsite via bus or by foot.

**Week of Service**: Monday through Thursday, July 11-14, we will gather at Ebenezer Lutheran Church between 8:00 and 8:15 a.m. to start our day and will be finished and ready for pickup at 5:00 p.m.

**Participation Packet Pick Up this year?** On Sunday, July 10, in the evening there will be a time for parents to pick up their child's t-shirts and information (forms and site waivers) for the week. It will also allow time for any questions.

A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR



Dear Good Shepherd family,

I am excited to formally announce that we will be serving as an internship congregation this coming year. Beginning on August 8, our new pastoral intern Laura Henrickson, will be joining us for a full year of ministry and learning! You can read her introduction here in this newsletter, but I want to explain a little about the program to you all. Here are some things to know and keep in mind:

## • First, note that this position is VERY different from the Teaching Parish program with which we are more familiar at Good Shepherd. The Teaching

Parish program is for first-year and second-year seminary students who serve for a few hours a week in worship and other aspects of ministry within a congregation. Our most recent Teaching Parish student was Aaron Spangler. Though we appreciate Aaron's time with us, Laura will be functioning in a much more comprehensive role. Laura is in her third year of Seminary, which is often the Internship Year. She will be with us full-time for a whole year. She will work among us approximately 40-50 hours per week in a pastoral role. During the course of the year, she will (with my supervision and guidance) do everything a pastor does in ministry. She will be involved with worship, education, pastoral care, preaching, leadership, evangelism, administration, stewardship, social ministry, and more. She will truly experience all that pastors are called to do, with the exceptions of officiating a wedding and presiding at the Communion meal.

- Keep in mind that Laura is not a carbon-copy of anyone else. Part of her role here at Good Shepherd is to explore and hone her own style of ministry. You should not expect her to function or respond in the same way as any previous student or staff member you've known.
- Keep in mind that Laura and her husband Thomas are coming into a new situation and this may require some time for adjustment. It can be more difficult for the spouse of an intern to make this adjustment than for the student herself, so I know you all will be mindful of their acclimatization process.
- As you can imagine, coming to a new congregation means meeting many new people. Remember, there is only one intern, but there are hundreds of you! You can help greatly by repeating your name to the intern for several months. Please get back into the habit of wearing your GSLC nametag regularly as you did during my early days here. If you need a (new or replacement) name tag, let me or the Evangelism Committee know.
- Don't hesitate to invite Laura to be involved in all aspects of the congregation's life and ministry that are beyond specific assignments I give her, but give her the grace and freedom to decline such invitations. It's not fair to expect Laura to do everything anyone suggests. I know you all will love her and include her, but part of her formation is learning how to set boundaries and manage time and expectations. Likewise, the intern's spouse should be given the same freedom to choose involvement as any church member has. I know you will give Laura and Thomas a gracious welcome.
- Laura will be with us to learn and to minister. You can help this process by sharing your understandings of the faith and ministry of the church and the opportunities you see for ministry in our community.

- Your loyalty, cooperation, understanding, and prayers will greatly enrich Laura's year with us and our experience of this internship program.
- This is a wonderful gift we are able to give to the church: we are helping to shape and form a pastor for ministry within the church. The things Laura learns with us will inform her ministry for years to come. Know that the Seminary and the wider church are grateful for this important service. Likewise, her time with us will be a real gift and we will be challenged, changed, and enriched by her time with us.

Please join me in welcoming Laura and Thomas to Good Shepherd next month. I am excited about this year of learning and ministering together. If you have any questions about the internship program, you can contact me at any time.

## Social Ministry

The special offering emphasis for July is the United Service Organizations (USO). The USO strengthens America's military service members by keeping them connected to family, home, and country, throughout their service to the nation. USO centers are operated at or near military installations across the United States and throughout the world, including in combat zones, and even un-staffed USO service sites in places too dangerous for anyone but combat troops to occupy. USO airport centers throughout the country, including Columbia Metropolitan Airport, offer around-the clock hospitality for traveling service members and their families. Many specialized USO programs offer a continuum of support to service members throughout their journey of service, from the first time they don the uniform until the last time they take it off.



Funds from our monthly emphasis will be used to support the local USO efforts in the greater Columbia area, including the USO Center at the Columbia airport.



## LECTIONARY FOR JULY 2022

#### JULY 3-4TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

God is the source of our nourishment. Jesus' invitation to "take and eat ... take and drink" is a repeated one. In holy communion, in the word read and proclaimed, in the assembly of the people of God, the dominion of God has come near. Rejoice! Your name is written in heaven.

#### FIRST READING – Isaiah 66:10-14

Those who returned from the exile found that the hopes for the glorious restoration of Judah were not completely fulfilled. For these disappointed people, the prophet envisions salvation in the image of a nursing woman. Mother Jerusalem and a mothering God remind the community how they are sustained and supported.

#### PSALM – Psalm 66:1-9

All the earth bows down before you and sings out your name. (Ps. 66:4)

#### SECOND READING – Galatians 6:1-16

In the close of his letter to the Galatians, Paul encourages them to live as people made right with God through faith in Jesus Christ. Here Paul offers practical advice about how believers exercise common concern for one other in "the family of faith."

#### GOSPEL - Luke 10:1-11, 16-20

Jesus commissions harvesters and laborers to go where he would go and do what he would do. Risking hardship and danger in exchange for the experience of great joy, they offer peace and healing as signs that the reign of God is near.

#### JULY 10—5TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

To love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, strength, and mind is to reflect God's mercy in responding to one's neighbor. That mercy found its most profound expression in the "gospel that has come to you"—namely the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. That gospel mercy comes to us again today: at the font, at the table, and from the pulpit. It is very near to you.

#### FIRST READING – Deuteronomy 30:9-14

Moses calls the people who are about to enter the promised land to renew the covenant God made with their ancestors. Through this covenant God gives life and asks for obedience. God's commandment is neither burdensome nor too far off, but dwells in the people's hearts.

#### PSALM – Psalm 25:1-10

Show me your ways, O LORD, and teach me your paths. (Ps. 25:4)

#### SECOND READING – Colossians 1:1-14

The letter to the Colossians was written to warn its readers of various false teachings. The first part of the letter is an expression of thanks for the faith, hope, and love that mark this community, including a prayer for strength and courage.

#### GOSPEL – Luke 10:25-37

Jesus is challenged to explain what is involved in obeying the greatest commandment. He tells a parable rich in surprises: those expected to show pity display hard hearts while the lowly give and receive unexpected and lavish mercy.

#### JULY 17—6TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Perhaps the church, at its best, is "all ears." God urges the faithful, again and again, to "listen up!"—to heed the word that gives life. So it was with Abraham and Sarah, Mary and Martha, and the early church at Colossae. So it is today as we join the assembly to hear the word of God, the word of life.

#### FIRST READING – Genesis 18:1-10a

The LORD visits Abraham and Sarah to tell them that the longawaited promise of the birth of a child will be fulfilled for them in their old age.

#### PSALM – Psalm 15

LORD, who may abide upon your holy hill? (Ps. 15:1) **SECOND READING – Colossians 1:15-28** 

This letter offers a mystical teaching, that the great mystery of God is "Christ in you." Because Christ is present in the church, Christians share in his life, suffering, and glory.

#### GOSPEL – Luke 10:38-42

During his visit to the home of Mary and Martha, Jesus reminds Martha that her concern for her many tasks distracts from the one thing that precedes all else: abiding in the presence of God.

#### <u>JULY 24— 7TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST</u>

Persistence in prayer is encouraged by Jesus and wins the attention of God when Abraham intercedes for Sodom. The life of the baptized—to be rooted and built up in Christ Jesus—is to be nurtured with prayer. God hears and answers prayer and so strengthens God's own. "When I called, you answered me; you increased my strength within me."

#### FIRST READING – Genesis 18:20-32

In today's reading, Abraham undertakes the role of a mediator between God and sinful humanity. Appealing to God's justice, Abraham boldly asks for mercy for the city of Sodom for the sake of the few righteous people there, including Abraham's nephew, Lot. PSALM Pool 128

#### PSALM – Psalm 138

Your steadfast love endures forever; do not abandon the works of your hands. (Ps. 138:8)

#### SECOND READING – Colossians 2:6-19

The writer of this letter warns the congregation in Colossae about "the empty lure" of philosophies and traditions that compromise faith. Through the gift of faith, the church is mystically connected with Christ in his death and resurrection which is enacted in baptism.

#### GOSPEL – Luke 11:1-13

In teaching his disciples this prayer, Jesus also reminds them to focus on God's coming reign, God's mercy, and the strengthening of the community. Jesus encourages his disciples to childlike trust and persistence in prayer.

#### JULY 31— 8TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Today's texts offer instruction and encouragement for all who are occasionally overwhelmed by the "unhappy business" of life. Jesus urges us to take care and be on guard against all kinds of greed. We who have died with Christ in holy baptism have also been raised with him and are encouraged to elevate our thinking, seeking the "things that are above." To that end we seek the sustenance of the Lord's supper and the encouragement of God's word.

FIRST READING - Ecclesiastes 1:2, 12-14; 2:18-23

The teacher of wisdom who wrote Ecclesiastes sees that working for mere accumulation of wealth turns life into an empty game, a "vanity of vanities." Nevertheless, he asserts in the next verse, it is good to find enjoyment in one's work because such enjoyment is a gift from God.

#### PSALM – Psalm 49:1-12

My mouth shall speak of wisdom. (Ps. 49:3)

#### SECOND READING – Colossians 3:1-11

Life in Christ includes a radical reorientation of our values. Just as the newly baptized shed their old clothes and put on new garments, so Christians are called to let go of greed and take hold of a life shaped by God's love in Christ.

#### GOSPEL – Luke 12:13-21

In God's reign, the "rich will be sent away empty." Jesus uses a parable to warn against identifying the worth of one's life with the value of one's possessions rather than one's relationship with God.


