A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR



"Do not be afraid, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom. Sell your possessions, and give alms. Make purses for yourselves that do not wear out, an unfailing treasure in heaven, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."—Luke 12:32-34

When I was a child, we gathered each year for Christmas with my extended family at my grandmother's house in North Carolina. Each year we would enjoy a large, delicious meal together. We usually didn't make it all the way through the meal before

my brother and I began to cause a disturbance. We were so excited to open presents that we could hardly stand it! Eventually we'd all clear the table and make our way to the living room to open gifts. My grandmother always sat in her chair and watched everyone else open their gifts. She always had a serene smile on her face. We always had to essentially beg her to open her gifts. She preferred to sit and watch our joy. Even when she did open her gifts, she savored the experience. She deftly removed the wrapping paper and saved it to use later. Then when she saw what someone had given her, she invariably said, "Oh, it's too much. It's too nice. Take it back."

Looking back on those times, I realize now that my grandmother was a person who developed the wisdom to appreciate that it is truly better to give than to receive. Our joy was expressed in wild abandon as we ripped open paper and craved more presents. Her joy, however, was in watching our joy and in treasuring the small things in life; those intangible gifts from God we often overlook.

I can't help but think our world could use a lot more folks like my grandmother in it today. People who prioritize the joy and comfort of others. People who are frugal and simple in their own actions and wants and needs. And not only does our world need more folks like that, but so do our churches. The lesson Jesus tries to teach his disciples in this gospel passage from Luke 12 is that our joy, our value, and our life do not consist in what we have, but rather in who has us. We are those in God's care. We are a little flock only because we have a Shepherd who came to cast out all fear. We are not called to get more for ourselves, but rather to follow Jesus in giving away what we have for the sake of others.

My grandmother, I believe, learned to live out Jesus' adage "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." She invested her treasure in the church, in her family, and in the lives of others. As she sat and watched our joy, her heart was content.

This teaching of Jesus is one which we desperately need to hear and live out together. Despite all that is going on in our world and in the church, we are not to be afraid. Rather, we are to invest all that God has given us in others. As we live out this call together, may we learn to live out the wise words of Jesus: "where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."





LECTIONARY FOR AUGUST 2022

AUGUST 7—9TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Jesus says, "It is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom." It is God's promise from the beginning—to Abraham, to the early church, and to the "little flock" of which we are a part in today's assembly. Faith, God's baptismal gift, trusts the promises of God. Have no fear.

FIRST READING - Genesis 15:1-6

God promises childless and aging Abram that a child of his own will be his heir and that his descendants will number as many as the stars. Abram trusts God's promise, and through this faith he is considered righteous.

PSALM - Psalm 33:12-22

Let your lovingkindness be upon us, as we place our hope in you. (Ps. 33:22)

SECOND READING - Hebrews 11:1-3, 8-16

Abraham and Sarah exemplify the vision of faith that people of God enact in every age. Their hope and trust in God's promise allowed them to face an unknown future and to receive the promise of God.

GOSPEL - Luke 12:32-40

Jesus encourages disciples to invest their hearts and live fully into God's reign. Instead of facing life with fear, those who know God's generosity are always ready to receive from God and to give to others.

AUGUST 14—10TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

The word of God is a refining fire. Jesus is the great divide in human history. He invites our undivided attention and devotion. Today in worship we are surrounded by a great "cloud of witnesses." In the word and in holy communion we are invited yet again to look to Jesus, "the pioneer and perfecter of our faith."

FIRST READING - Jeremiah 23:23-29

Because Jeremiah preaches the unpopular message of God's judgment, he suffers rejection. Today's reading distinguishes between the true prophet, like Jeremiah, who speaks God's word, and the false prophet who misleads the people through dreams. One is like wheat; the other like worthless straw.

PSALM - Psalm 82

Arise, O God, and rule the earth. (Ps. 82:8)

SECOND READING - Hebrews 11:29-12:2

The author of Hebrews presents us with rich stories of faith. In a long list of biblical heroes, we find examples of trust in God that enabled them to face the trials of life faithfully. In addition to this "cloud of witnesses," we have Jesus, the perfect model of faithful endurance.

GOSPEL - Luke 12:49-56

Jesus delivers harsh words about the purifying and potentially divisive effects of obedience to God's call. The way of the cross often leads followers to encounter hostility and rejection, even from those they love.

AUGUST 21—11TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Remember the sabbath day. Call the sabbath a delight. This is the Lord's day, and the Lord will do for us what the Lord does: feed us, forgive us, help and heal us. Rejoice at all the wonderful things God is doing.

FIRST READING - Isaiah 58:9b-14

God promises those who have returned from exile that where justice and mercy prevail, the ruins will be rebuilt and light will rise in the darkness. It is a day for new beginnings.

PSALM - Psalm 103:1-8

The LORD crowns you with mercy and steadfast love. (Ps. 103:4)

SECOND READING - Hebrews 12:18-29

Using images of Moses, the writer presents a striking vision of the new covenant of God made possible in Christ. There is no longer fear; only awe in the new promise in Christ into which we are invited.

GOSPEL - Luke 13:10-17

Jesus heals a woman on the sabbath, offering her a new beginning for her life. When challenged by a narrow reading of the sabbath command, Jesus responds by expanding "sabbath work" to include setting people free from bondage.

<u>AUGUST 28—12TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST</u>

Invited and inviting—that is the nature of the church. By God's grace in holy baptism we have a place at Christ's banquet table. When, by the power of that same Spirit, humility and mutual love continue among us, the church can be more inviting still.

FIRST READING - Proverbs 25:6-7

The book of Proverbs is part of a collection of writings known as wisdom literature. Wisdom literature gave directions to Israel's leaders and people for the conduct of daily life. Today's reading is about humility.

PSALM - Psalm 112

The righteous are merciful and full of compassion. (Ps. 112:4)

SECOND READING - Hebrews 13:1-8, 15-16

The conclusion of the letter to the Hebrews contains suggestions for the conduct of a holy life, all of which are shaped by God's love toward us in Jesus Christ.

GOSPEL - Luke 14:1, 7-14

Jesus observes guests jockeying for position at the table. He uses the opportunity to teach his hearers to choose humility rather than self-exaltation. Jesus also makes an appeal for hosts to imitate God's gracious hospitality to those in need.


