THE LONG GREEN SEASON

The six principal festivals of Christianity have now come and gone. You weren't aware that there are six principal festivals. There are. They begin each year in December with Christmas. January follows with Epiphany. Then, while the order is always the same, the arrival of the other four festivals depends on Easter - Easter with its loveable formula of the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Spring Equinox. So, though Christmas is always on December 25 and Epiphany is always on January 6, all the other festival dates are dependent on Easter. Transfiguration is always the last Sunday in Epiphany, and can occur anywhere from 4 to 8 Sundays after Epiphany depending on Easter's variable date. Pentecost is always 50 days after Easter – coming somewhere between late May and mid-June. Holy Trinity Sunday is always the Sunday after Pentecost – the only time in the church year when two major festivals occur back to back. Then comes the Long Green Season – the Sundays after Pentecost. which, again according to Easter's date, can have as many as 27 Sundays after Pentecost, closing with Christ the King, the last Sunday of the church year.

So, now, we're entering that Long Green Season which begins here in June and will continue until late November. You've probably noticed that the first four festivals are tied to events in Jesus' life: birth, the arrival of the magi, the revelation to Peter, James, and John on the mountaintop, Jesus' resurrection. The fifth festival, Pentecost, recounts the beginning of the church's proclamation of the Gospel. The sixth, Holy Trinity, the only festival tied to a doctrine, tries to make sense of the existential experience of God, i.e. three persons, one God. Following that, we come to Sundays after Pentecost.

I call it the Long Green Season, because we go for a very long time with green paraments (those cloths that hang on the altar and pulpit), with only a break at the end of October and the beginning of November. Coming as they do, these Sundays after Pentecost, we often refer to them collectively as the 'Season of the Church.'

We do that, for the very real reason, that this time in the church year is the time in which we concentrate on just how we live out this salvation we have been given in Jesus – both as an individual and as a community called church. One thing that often gets over-looked in modern American Protestantism is Jesus' overwhelming movement in his conversations from the individual to the community. Over and over again, when someone comes to question Jesus, he shifts the conversation from 2nd person singular to 2nd person plural – Jesus addresses the crowd, the community, not just the questioner. This is not necessarily easily perceived in our English translations, but is quite clear in the original Greek.

The Long Green Season is the Season of the Church is the Season of Us. It's the season for the body of Christ, which is the community of believers. We are called by Jesus into that community, and it is out of that community that we make his name known to the world. This Long Green Season is for us, and in being for us, is for the whole world. Amen.

MESSAGE FROM YOUR COUNCIL PRESIDENT....

In my message to you last month, I mentioned and anticipated the upcoming SC Synod Assembly --"Joining God in the Neighborhood." Pastor John, David & Karen Lucas, Emily Whitlow, Don Hyatt and I represented Good Shepherd at this our annual synodical gathering. It was a great experience to be with representatives from congregations across the Synod; hear reports from all aspects of ministry throughout our synod and churchwide; sing, pray and commune together; and conduct the necessary business which included multiple elected positions and adopting a \$2,498,600 budget for 2020-2021. A highlight was having SC State Superintendent of Education Molly Spearman share her vision for schools in South Carolina. The top priority of that vision is school safety and teacher support. She reminded us that "we need churches to show up. We cannot come in and teach about Jesus, but we can act like Jesus and show students the love and hope that comes from Jesus."

And, that's a part of what "Joining God in the Neighborhood" is all about. I pray we here at Good Shepherd can show up. I'm asking each of you – WELCA groups, LMM, Sunday School classes, YOGS, Social Ministry Committee – each of US to reach out and see how we can concretely help in some way a neighborhood school, a class, a student.

Look in other areas of this newsletter to read Emily Whitlow's sharing of her experience at Synod Assembly and to see some interesting facts about our SC Synod-ELCA.

2019 SOUTH CAROLINA SYNOD ASSEMBLY REFLECTION

This past month, I was lucky enough to attend the 194th Annual Meeting of the Lutheran Church in South Carolina (and the 32nd Assembly of the South Carolina Synod-ELCA!) as Good Shepherd's "Under 30" Voting Member. The theme for the assembly this year, Joining God in the Neighborhood, was centered around the Gospel of Luke 10:27 which reads: "Jesus said... 'Love the Lord your God with all your passion and prayer and muscle and intelligence—and love your neighbor as well as you do yourself." Throughout the assembly, we often were reminded of how this verse would apply in our daily lives: outside of the assembly (in our communities) as well as during the assembly (when we would vote on matters.) One of the most memorable parts of the assembly was when South Carolina's Superintendent of Education spoke of her work with schools in the low country, in particular Allendale, Williamsburg, and Florence Four schools. Somewhat recently, in 2015, the Department of Education opened a new Office of Family and Community Engagement (FACE) intended to support faith, community, and non-profit volunteer efforts in school systems. Over the past four years, the office has developed a volunteer guide and framework that has been distributed to over 2,000 churches. 212 churches have worked with the FACE Office to become involved in local schools and Molly Spearman noted the South Carolina Bishops' Public Education Initiative has been instrumental in the SCDOE's efforts to increase involvement. Spearman also said, "We need churches to show up! Don't come up with a program, but ask 'What can I do to help you?" Although we cannot go into schools and teach about Jesus, we surely can "act like Jesus and show students the love and hope that comes from Jesus." I believe that this mindset can be used throughout many parts of life: welcoming a visitor in our church who may or may not be familiar with the Word, working with the people of Transitions and GSLC's Food Pantry, and many more. Often times, people will remember how you treated them over the words you spoke to them. Especially during this time of transition in our church, it's very important to reach out to those you haven't seen in a while or those you have not met before. In my personal experience, the overwhelming sense of love and welcome I received upon visiting GSLC was what ultimately led my family to call Good Shepherd our church home. You truly never know how much your kind (or negative) actions and words affect those around you, your neighbors. So my challenge to those reading is: go out of your way to hold that Big Red door open, make sure you ask the new face at the back of the church how they're doing, and above all, remember what it was like for you when you started your faith journey.

WELCA NEWS

The WELCA Unit of Good Shepherd met on Sunday, May 19 after Service for a luncheon and program on Lighthouse for Life. We created Freedom Bags for Lighthouse for Life (organization supports victims of human trafficking). These bags consist of things that we take for granted, but mean everything to those who receive them. Thanks to all who brought salads, desserts and helped stuff bags.

The SC WELCA Convention was June 7-8. Sara Hydrick and Karen Lucas attended to represent Good Shepherd. The theme this year was "Grace in Community." Good Shepherd exemplified the theme by donating 36 Freedom Bags for Lighthouse for Life (organization supports victims of human trafficking). We donated money also. In all SC WELCA donated 428 Freedom bags to Lighthouse for Life and \$9,030.99 in money and gift cards. We were all in tears as our speaker was a survivor and recipient of help from Lighthouse for Life. Thanks to all those at Good Shepherd who participated in this worthy cause.

Also as part of the Convention we signed cards for Veterans and those serving in our Armed Forces. We signed 2500 cards and gave 500 cards to each Branch of Service.







CONTINUING RESOLUTION PASSED BY COUNCIL

For quite some time, study has been given by a specially appointed Constitution Task Force concerning the number of Council positions, the length of Council term and Council nomination/ election process here at Good Shepherd. At the April 28, 2019, Council meeting, the Task Force presented their recommendations and these were received as information. Council members reviewed and studied the recommendations and acted upon them at their May meeting.

A Continuing Resolution was approved by Council on May 19, 2019, to temporarily modify the Good Shepherd Constitution and Bylaws until such time that Good Shepherd has a full time Pastor and guides this Task Force forward to a more permanent document. During our transition time, this modification will allow more continuity in the Council membership since no positions will be open at the end of this year. It allows for a shorter time of commitment. It promotes more flexibility for lay leaders and encourages non-Council members to take leadership roles as chairpersons of committees.

The specific changes are:

- The number of Council positions from 15 to 10.
- The term of office reduced from three to two vears.
- The <u>Youth</u> shall nominate one individual under age of 21 to serve for one year.
- The tenure shall be arranged from one-third to <u>one-half</u> of terms expire annually.
- The Council members shall be eligible to serve no more than one full term (two years) but after expiration of <u>one year</u> may become eligible for election.
- The <u>Executive Committee</u> shall serve as the Nominating Committee to Council. Council has right to amend nominations before presenting to congregation.
- The congregation will have opportunity to add nominees from the floor at least two weeks prior to election. Election held no later than October 31.
- The nominations will be presented as a slate to fill needed positions.

LECTIONARY FOR JULY 2019

JULY 7 – 4TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

God is the source of our nourishment. Our Lord's invitation to "take and eat . . . take and drink" is a repeated one. In the holy eucharist, in the word read and proclaimed, in the assembly of the people of God, the dominion of God has come near. Rejoice! Your name is written in heaven.

FIRST READING - Isaiah 66:10-14

Those who returned from the exile found that the hopes for the glorious restoration of Judah were not completely fulfilled. For these disappointed people, the prophet envisions salvation in the image of a nursing woman. Mother Jerusalem and a mothering God remind the community how they are sustained and supported.

PSALM - Psalm 66:1-9

All the earth bows down before you and sings out your name. (Ps. 66:4)

SECOND READING - Galatians 6:[1-6] 7-16

In the close of his letter to the Galatians, Paul encourages them to live as people made right with God through faith in Jesus Christ. Here Paul offers practical advice about how believers exercise common concern for one other in "the family of faith."

GOSPEL - Luke 10:1-11, 16-20

Jesus commissions harvesters and laborers to go where he would go and do what he would do. Risking hardship and danger in exchange for the experience of great joy, they offer peace and healing as signs that the reign of God is near.

JULY 14 - 5TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

To love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, strength, and mind is to reflect God's mercy in responding to one's neighbor. That mercy found its most profound expression in the "gospel that has come to you"—namely the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. That gospel mercy comes to us again today: at the font, at the altar, and from the pulpit. It is very near to you.

FIRST READING - Deuteronomy 30:9-14

Moses calls the people who are about to enter the promised land to renew the covenant God made with their ancestors. Through this covenant God gives life and asks for obedience. God's commandment is neither burdensome nor too far off, but dwells in the people's own hearts.

PSALM - Psalm 25:1-10

Show me your ways, O LORD, and teach me your paths. (Ps. 25:4)

SECOND READING - Colossians 1:1-14

The letter to the Colossians was written to warn its readers of various false teachings. The first part of the letter is an expression of thanks for the faith, hope, and love that mark this community, including a prayer for strength and courage from Paul.

GOSPEL - Luke 10:25-37

Jesus is challenged to explain what is involved in obeying the greatest commandment. Jesus tells a parable rich in surprises: those expected to show pity display hard hearts while the lowly give and receive unexpected and lavish mercy.

JULY 21 - 6TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Perhaps the church, at its best, is "all ears." Almighty God urges the faithful, again and again, to "listen up!"—to heed the word from above. So it was with Abraham and Sarah, with Mary and Martha, and the early church at Colossae. So it is today as we join the assembly to hear the word of God. the words of life.

FIRST READING - Genesis 18:1-10a

The Lord visits Abraham and Sarah to tell them that the long—awaited promise of the birth of a child will be fulfilled for them in their old age.

PSALM - Psalm 15

LORD, who may abide upon your holy hill? (Ps. 15:1)

SECOND READING - Colossians 1:15-28

Sometimes Paul preaches with great attention to theological concepts. Here, however, Paul offers a mystical teaching, that the great mystery of God is "Christ in you." Because Christ is present in the church, Christians share in his life, suffering, and glory.

GOSPEL – Luke 10:38-42

Jesus uses his visit to two sisters as an occasion to remind disciples that an important aspect of obedience is singleminded devotion to Jesus and his word.

JULY 28 - 7TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Persistence in prayer evoked the admiration of Jesus and wins the attention of the Lord when Abraham intercedes for Sodom. The life of the baptized—to be rooted and built up in Christ Jesus the Lord—is to be rooted in prayer. God hears and answers prayer and so strengthens God's own. "When I called, you answered me; you increased my strength within me."

FIRST READING - Genesis 18:20-32

In today's reading, Abraham undertakes the role of a mediator between God and sinful humanity. Appealing to God's justice, Abraham boldly asks for mercy for the city of Sodom, for the sake of the few righteous people who are in it, including Abraham's nephew, Lot.

PSALM - Psalm 138

Your steadfast love endures forever; do not abandon the works of your hands. (Ps. 138:8)

SECOND READING - Colossians 2:6-15 [16-19]

Paul warns his congregation in Colossae about "the empty lure" of philosophies and traditions that compromise faith. Through the gift of faith, the church is mystically connected with Christ in his death and resurrection, which is enacted in baptism.

GOSPEL – Luke 11:1-13

In teaching his disciples this prayer, Jesus also reminds them to focus on God's coming reign, God's mercy, and the strengthening of the community. Jesus encourages his disciples to child-like trust and persistence in prayer. PAGE 11 XLIII, ISSUE VII
