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# A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR



-Luke 1:78-79

By the tender mercy of our God,
the dawn from on high will break upon us,
to give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death,
to guide our feet into the way of peace.

Last month I wrote to you explaining that God is calling us to new ventures together. Life and ministry during this pandemic are certainly different from life and ministry back in February and March. And as this pandemic continues; even once it ends, life and ministry will be different. God is still leading and guiding us, just as God led and guided us when our forebears founded this congregation. God is leading and guiding us, just as God did during many wonderful years of ministry in this place. And though we have now been forced to live through a relatively fallow and seemingly fruitless time, God will bring us through to a new time of life and ministry together.

In some ways I feel as though we have been stuck in Lent since the pandemic began. During the closure of our church building for public worship, I left the purple paraments up in the sanctuary well beyond Lent since we were not using the liturgical colors to help us mark the passage of the church year. Each time I went into the sanctuary, I noted how appropriate this seemed given what we were going through. The time of solemnity and sacrifice seems to have lasted well into the year for us. The other church seasons have been a blur, quite honestly.

Yet late this month we enter into my favorite of all the church seasons—Advent. I don't know about you, but I am in desperate need of an Advent season these days. I know, I know you are all looking forward to Christmas. I am, as well. Each year, for four long Sundays in Advent I hear the question, "Pastor, when can we sing Christmas hymns?" I love Christmas hymns, too. But hear me out. It is Advent hymns that speak most powerfully and most profoundly to our current situation.

Advent is a time of hopeful waiting. Advent is a time to prepare for God's new works and new life among us. Advent is like watching the dawn break on a new day at the end of a long, cold, dark night. Advent, like no other season of the church year, takes into account how miserable and hopeless our human situation can seem, yet also how powerful and full of promise God's response can be. If this doesn't encapsulate the feel of 2020, I don't know what will!

Consider the second and third verses of *People, Look East* by Eleanor Farjeon (ELW 248): Furrows, be glad. Though earth is bare, one more seed is planted there. Give up your strength, the seed to nourish that in the course the flow'r may flourish. People, look east, and sing today—Love, the Rose, is on the way.

Stars, keep the watch. When night is dim, one more light the bowl shall brim, shining beyond the frosty weather, bright as the sun and moon together. People, look east, and sing today—Love, the Star, is on the way.

There is something profoundly beautiful about the hopeful expectation and anticipation of Advent. It is deeply fitting that, as the year gets colder and days get darker, we look with joyful longing toward the coming of Jesus Christ. Like a rose springing up from soil we thought was dead and dormant; like a star shining forth in an otherwise empty sky, Christ comes among us when things seem at their worst.

How perfect this imagery is in this year—a year which in many ways seems like a dead furrow in a field or like a cloudy and starless sky. Indeed, Love is on the way. His name is Jesus Christ our Lord.

We know that in Advent we celebrate Christ's earthly coming, we look for his second coming, and we celebrate his coming among us as we live out our faith together. This year, may this coming of our Lord break into our darkness that much more powerfully. As dark as this year seems at times, may Christ's light shine that much brighter for us.

## COUNCIL PRESIDENT'S UPDATE

This has been a challenging year to say the least. As we entered the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter of 2020, we continue to struggle with Covid-19 and many decisions. With an uptick of infections, we continue to err on the side of caution. While we had originally hoped that we could re-enter the sanctuary by Reformation, that plan just did not work out. I have heard from several who want us to restart in church services and an equally number who say let's not rush it. I can assure you once the go ahead is given we will re-enter with a service as safe as possible.

The Restart Task Force will be meeting shortly to once again discuss a plan for services. The Worship Life Committee has been asked to look at and plan a service so we would be ready if we received the go ahead. They are working with Pastor Andrew looking at things such as communion and the type of service including music. There are a lot of questions to be considered. We want to be ready when the time comes. And we want you to be comfortable making a decision that is best for you.

The Technical team is also setting up the streaming equipment that was purchased through a grant from our foundation along with gifts from individuals. It will take us a few weeks to get everything set up and configured and tested before we put the stream out on YouTube. Currently that is the only platform we are considering. At this point, I doubt Facebook will be an option. You will be hearing more about this in the coming weeks or hopefully days.

Also remember that the FAB is now open for groups up to 15 people. Bible Study as well as council and some committees are using the FAB regularly. Please schedule with the office before planning your meeting.

If you are not attending Drive-In Worship, give it a try, you might just like it. We have been averaging about 75 people.

# FROM THE PROPERTY COMMITTEE

Progress has been made on the following projects:

- 1. **Narthex Roof Repair:** Work will begin as soon as the repairs can be scheduled with the roofing contractor, CE Bourne.
- Stained Glass Project: The nighttime backlighting of the glass is being reviewed to determine the placement and type of lighting needed.
- 3. Education Building HVAC Replacement:

The old monolithic HVAC system has been replaced by four separate units. The Youth Room unit was installed several weeks ago. The remaining three units for the upper level of the Education Building were installed October 12-14. The old HVAC unit in the equipment room will be removed the week of October 19<sup>th</sup>. The old electrical panels will then be removed. The new units operate for specific zones, greatly reducing the amount of energy needed to heat and cool the building.

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Thanks to all those members who attended this event with their families and a big thank you to all our volunteers who helped set up, decorate their trunks and give out treats to kids.

















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# LECTIONARY FOR NOVEMBER 2020

#### **NOVEMBER 1 – ALL SAINTS SUNDAY**

All Saints celebrates the baptized people of God, living and dead, who are the body of Christ. As November heralds the dying of the landscape in many northern regions, the readings and liturgy call us to remember all who have died in Christ and whose baptism is complete. At the Lord's table we gather with the faithful of every time and place, trusting that the promises of God will be fulfilled and that all tears will be wiped away in the new Jerusalem.

#### FIRST READING - Revelation 7:9-17

The book of Revelation is written to seven churches in western Asia Minor during a time of great oppression. Today's reading is a response to the question asked in 6:17: "Who is able to stand?" The writer gives the faithful the assurance of God's protection and a vision of victory.

#### PSALM - Psalm 34:1-10, 22

Fear the LORD, you saints of the LORD; for those who fear the LORD lack nothing. (Ps. 34:9)

#### SECOND READING - 1 John 3:1-3

A saint is one who has been set apart by God for God's purposes. God, out of divine love, set us apart to be the children of God. Our holy hope is that we shall see God as God really is.

#### GOSPEL - Matthew 5:1-12

In the Beatitudes, Jesus provides a unique description of those who are blessed with God's favor. His teaching is surprising and shocking to those who seek wealth, fame, and control over others.

#### **NOVEMBER 8 – 23RD SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST**

Today the prophet Amos calls for justice to roll down like waters. Paul urges us to encourage one another with the promised coming of the Lord. Jesus tells the parable of the wise and foolish bridesmaids. Surrounded by the faithful of every time and place, we celebrate Christ's coming in our midst in the word of life and the feast of victory—the marriage feast of the lamb.

#### FIRST READING - Amos 5:18-24

In the days of Amos, people thought that the day of the LORD would be a time of great victory, but Amos announced that it would be a day of darkness, not light. He said liturgy is no substitute for obedience. The LORD demands justice and righteousness in the community.

#### PSALM - Psalm 70

You are my helper and my deliverer; O LORD, do not tarry. (Ps. 70:5)

#### SECOND READING - 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18

Some of the Thessalonians are worried that dead Christians will be excluded from the resurrection to eternal life when Christ comes again. Paul reassures them with the word of hope that all Christians, living or dead, will be raised into everlasting life with Christ.

#### GOSPEL - Matthew 25:1-13

Jesus tells a parable about his own second coming, emphasizing the need for readiness at all times.

#### <u>NOVEMBER 15 – 24TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST</u>

Our readings during November speak of the end times. Zephaniah proclaims that the coming day of the LORD will be filled with wrath and distress. Paul says it will come like a thief in the night and urges us to be awake and sober. Jesus tells the parable of the talents, calling us to use our gifts, while we still have time, for the greater and common good. In a world filled with violence and despair, we gather around signs of hope—word, water, bread, and wine—eager to welcome the good news of Christ's coming among us.

#### FIRST READING - Zephaniah 1:7, 12-18

Zephaniah (like the prophet Amos in last week's first reading) presents the day of the LORD as one of judgment and wrath. Descriptions of the last day in the New Testament include

details taken from Old Testament accounts of the day of the LORD.

#### PSALM - Psalm 90:1-8 [9-11] 12

So teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts to wisdom. (Ps. 90:12)

#### SECOND READING - 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11

Though we do not know and cannot calculate the day of Christ's return, we live faithfully in the here and now as we anticipate the day when we will be given eternal salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ.

#### GOSPEL - Matthew 25:14-30

Jesus tells a parable about his second coming, indicating that it is not sufficient merely to maintain things as they are. Those who await his return should make good use of the gifts that God has provided them.

#### **NOVEMBER 22 – CHRIST THE KING**

On this final Sunday of the church year our gospel is Jesus' great story of judgment. In the end, the faithful are those who served Christ by ministering to those who are poor, hungry, naked, sick, or estranged. In the first reading God is the shepherd who seeks the lost, weak, and injured and feeds them with justice. We gather this day to celebrate the reign of Christ and his victory over death, yet we await the consummation of all things yet to come. Acknowledging Christ as our merciful ruler, we go forth that his reign may be known in our loving words and deeds.

#### FIRST READING - Ezekiel 34:11-16, 20-24

Because Israel's kings proved to be bad shepherds, Ezekiel declares that the LORD will assume the role of shepherd in Israel. The LORD will also set over them a shepherd-messiah, "my servant David," who will feed and care for the people.

#### PSALM - Psalm 95:1-7a

We are the people of God's pasture and the sheep of God's hand. (Ps. 95:7)

#### SECOND READING – Ephesians 1:15-23

In this passage, God is praised for revealing ultimate divine power in raising Jesus from the dead. The resurrected, exalted Christ is Lord of both the church and the entire universe, now and in the age to come.

#### GOSPEL - Matthew 25:31-46

Jesus compares himself to a king who moves among his subjects to see how he is treated: what is done for the least of those who belong to his family is truly done for him.

#### NOVEMBER 29 - FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Stir up your power, and come! The psalmist's plea in Psalm 80:2 has become familiar to us in the Advent prayers. Isaiah wants God to rip the heavens open. Both cry out for an apparently distant, angry God to show up, to save, to restore. When we hear Jesus describing the coming of the Son of Man with stars falling from heaven, it can sound dire and horrible, not like anything we would ever hope for. But when we really look at the suffering of people God loves, we can share the hope that God would tear open the heavens and come.

#### FIRST READING - Isaiah 64:1-9

This lament comes from a people who have had their hopes shattered. The visions of a rebuilt Jerusalem and a renewed people of God, spoken of in Isaiah 40–55, have not been realized. Instead, the people experience ruin, conflict, and famine. This lament calls God to account—to be the God who has brought deliverance in the past.

#### PSALM - Psalm 80:1-7, 17-19

Let your face shine upon us, and we shall be saved. (Ps. 80:7) **SECOND READING – 1 Corinthians 1:3-20** 

# As the Christians in Corinth await the advent of Jesus, Paul

reminds them how the Lord has already enriched them through spiritual gifts and will continue to strengthen them until the coming day of the Lord.

#### **GOSPEL – Mark 13:24-37**

Jesus encourages his followers to look forward to the day when he returns in power and glory to end all suffering. PAGE 11 XLIV, ISSUE XI
