# STEWARDSHIP 2021-2022 "Renew, Respond, Reach Out" 2 TIMOTHY 1:6 "... REKINDLE THE GIFT OF GOD"

As this notorious COVID pandemic continues to plague us, the challenges, uncertainty, and, even unfairness, of this life are apparent in real and sometimes in very painful and personal ways.

As the apostle Paul reminded his young protégé, Timothy, suffering, sacrifice, and death are inherent to this life, but "... our Savior Christ Jesus, (has) abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel." (2 Timothy 1:10)

That is the rest of the story. That is God's promise realized through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. That is our inheritance. That is the

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## A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR



"If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free." —John 8:31b-32

Each Reformation Sunday, we study these words of Jesus. This passage in John is part of a debate between Jesus and the religious authorities of his day. Jesus shifts from the narrative of the Exodus brought up by the religious authorities and plays on this idea of freedom. Jesus talks about being made free—free *from* sin, but also free *for* life and service in the kingdom of God.

The reason this passage comes up every year on Reformation Sunday is that a similar debate about freedom came up during Martin Luther's day. He began to notice that some church authorities were causing or condoning abuses in the church—the sale of forgiveness in the form of indulgences, the practice of awarding the wealthy with high church offices such as priest and bishop, and the use of resources to enrich church officials rather than to care for the poor, the orphan, and the widow (to name a few). Luther realized that the truth of the Gospel was being obscured or intentionally ignored by a few powerful and privileged people. Worse still, the common people were mostly kept in the dark about these abuses because they could not read or write and, therefore, could not understand what was being done around them.

Luther saw this issue of freedom versus slavery as a very real issue in his own day. And so we focus on this passage from John each year on Reformation Sunday. This certainly makes us grateful for Luther's work—a proud heritage we share as Lutherans. We celebrate the fact that the church was indeed reformed, even as we mourn the fact that the church was divided over the issues Luther raised.

More important than our heritage and history, however, is the truth of Jesus' words for us in our own day and age. His sobering reminder to us still rings true: "anyone who sins is a slave to sin. If the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed." The truth of the matter is that Jesus has indeed set us free—free *from* sin, death, and the devil. Of equal importance, however, is what Jesus has set us free *for*. We are freed *for* life in this kingdom of God. We are freed *for* the sake of our neighbors in need. We are freed *for* acts of charity and love and service. The Son has indeed set us free.

But we often live as if the bars are still locked. We often choose to remain bound by the powers of darkness and deception. We often choose to gorge ourselves on the empty food the world offers rather than allowing the body and blood of Christ to truly nourish and shape our lives. I invite you to ponder in what areas of your life you choose captivity and reject the freedom Christ offers. Perhaps you choose to be captive to greed, gluttony, or sloth. Perhaps you remain enslaved to lust. Perhaps you allow your calendar and your clock to master you rather than making time for God. We all face temptations to choose to remain slaves to sin, but Christ calls us to come to where he is—the freedom and life of the kingdom of God.

I implore you to ponder how you choose to be captive to sin. But then I invite you to begin to turn those areas of your life over to Christ, trusting the Son to set you truly free. Maybe that looks like a deeper commitment of your treasure to the causes of the kingdom of God. Maybe it looks like reprioritizing your schedule so that matters of the kingdom (worship, service, fellowship, and learning) come *first* in your life. Maybe it looks like putting your gifts to work in a new ministry or committee. Choose to reject the lies and the lost ways Christ as freed us *from*. Choose the ways of life, love, and service Christ has freed us *for*.

## GOOD SHEPHERD FOUNDATION

The Good Shepherd Foundation was created to assist the Church in carrying out its religious, charitable, educational and other tax exempt missions. The Foundation accomplishes its purpose by collecting contributions, donations and bequests, investing Foundation assets and then making distributions in the form of grants to appropriate persons and organizations as defined by Foundation policies. In accordance with the operating policies of the Foundation, grants may be awarded in the following four areas:

- Grants for outreach to the community, including institutions and agencies that have common goals
  as Good Shepherd Church. Programs should target those in our community that have spiritual and/
  or economic need.
- Grants to agencies of the South Carolina Synod of the ELCA for missions at home and abroad.
- Grants to members of Good Shepherd Church for Christian education and training.
- Grants for non-budgeted projects of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church.

Grants are awarded twice yearly. Deadline for applications is November 1. Awards are made shortly after deadline dates.

How will you respond?


The gift of God resides in each one of us. That gift was bestowed publicly at your Baptism. The Baptismal candle represents the lighting of your flame of faith. Through the power and intercession of the Holy Spirit within you, that spark continues. It never goes out. The question is, how well is the flame being tended? How brightly does that flame burn? Is it smoldering or is it burning brightly?


In times of trouble, when the cares, frustrations, and evils of this life weigh on one's heart, it may become a real challenge to keep your flame burning. But, remember – God's flame never totally goes out. It is up to each individual to keep your flame burning; and, if the flame begins to smolder, to rekindle the flame. Your flame burns by means of the use of your gifts and through affirming your personal relationship with Jesus through worship, prayer, Bible reading and study, and through service to others.

#### Come and See: Classroom 1

Guest Speaker: Dr. Tony Everett

Topic: W.I.G.I.A.T. (Where is God in all this?)

DESCRIPTION: Class participants will use biblical models to discern God's presence and guidance in everyday life issues. We will consider questions such as Why do some people seem to bounce back from confusion, changes, and trauma and others do not? What would Jesus do, really? What is all this "mindfulness God-in-your-brain" stuff they were talking about during the Olympics? Why can't we all just get along, anyway?

#### Fellowship Class: Classroom 5 (will start on October 24)

Bible Study Leader: Don Caughman

Topic: Honoring God

Description: This study explores how worship in its many forms honors God. When we gather for worship or set ourselves individually to pray, we enter into a relationship with God and with God's people. The purpose of this study is to help adult learners engage biblical passages in order to see how worship is shaped by faith, and how worship nurtures faith.

Dating to 1976 when Lutheran Family Services was formed, LSC provides for a variety of human services needs in the Carolinas. The current organization was formed in 2012 when Lutheran Family Services merged with Lutheran Services for the Aging in North Carolina.

Our October emphasis on LSC is stressing support for expanding the temporary foster care program in the Midlands of South Carolina, supporting resettlement of Afghan refugees in the Columbia area, and supporting a new residential program for women dealing with addictions at Kinard Manor in Greenwood.

You may make contributions to support LSC with a special offering any Sunday in October. You may also send your donations to the church office.

## **Noisy Offering October 31**

Keep saving those coins during October. We will have another Noisy Offering on Sunday, October 31. Of course, we'll accept folding money and checks as well! The recipient of the offering will be Palmetto Place, a shelter in Columbia for abused and neglected children and teenagers.

Founded in 1977 by the Junior Woman's Club, Palmetto Place provides a safe haven for abused and neglected children and for homeless teenagers from throughout South Carolina. During those 44 years, more than 7,500 abused, neglected and abused children have found a safe haven.

Children who come to Palmetto Place, normally through referral by the Department of Social Services, have access to after-school programs, tutoring and recreational and social activities.

Financial contributions may be made through Good Shepherd each of the five Sundays in October or at the church office. You may use the pink special offering envelopes and indicate that the contribution is for Palmetto Place. We also will have a collection bucket on the table outside the church office the last two weeks of October if you'd like to drop off your offerings.

At the end of the month, all donations will be given collectively to Palmetto Place as a gift from Good Shepherd. More information about the work of Palmetto Place Children's Shelter can be found on their website.

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## **LECTIONARY FOR OCTOBER 2021**

#### **OCTOBER 3—19TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST**

Today's gospel combines a saying that makes many of us uncomfortable with a story we find comforting. Jesus' saying on divorce is another of his rejections of human legislation in favor of the original intent of God's law. Jesus' rebuke of the disciples who are fending off the children should challenge us as well. What does it mean to receive the kingdom of God as a child does?

#### FIRST READING - Genesis 2:18-24

Genesis 2 stresses that people are not meant to live in isolation but in relationship. Out of love for humanity, God creates them male and female, to provide companionship for each other and to become with each other "one flesh." The Hebrew words used here are ish (man) and ishshah (woman).

#### PSALM - Psalm 8

You crown us with glory and honor. (Ps. 8:5)

#### SECOND READING - Hebrews 1:1-4; 2:5-12

Quoting from the psalms, this passage from Hebrews emphasizes that Jesus, the one through whom God created everything and who sits at God's right hand, is also the one who experienced human suffering and death in order to blaze the path of salvation for us.

GOSPEL – Mark 10:2-16

Jesus announced and enacted in history the new reality of God's surprising activity. These two stories demonstrate this new reality: Women and children are accepted and valued, not dismissed as inferior to adult men.

#### OCTOBER 10-20TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

The rich man who comes to ask Jesus what he should do to inherit eternal life is a good man, sincere in his asking. Mark's gospel is alone in saying that Jesus looked on him and loved him. Out of love, not as judgment, Jesus offers him an open door to life: sell all you own and give it to the poor. Our culture bombards us with the message that we will find life by consuming. Our assemblies counter this message with the invitation to find life by divesting for the sake of the other.

#### FIRST READING - Amos 5:6-7, 10-15

Amos was a herdsman by profession and a prophet by God's call. During a time of great prosperity in the northern kingdom of Israel, the prophet speaks to the wealthy upper class. He warns his listeners that fulfilling God's demand for justice brings blessing, while corruption and oppression incur God's wrath.

#### PSALM - Psalm 90:12-17

So teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts to wisdom. (Ps. 90:12)

#### SECOND READING - Hebrews 4:12-16

We cannot hide our thoughts, desires, and actions from God, to whom we are completely accountable. Nevertheless, Jesus understands our human weakness and temptations, because he also experienced them. Therefore we can approach the throne of grace to receive divine mercy from Christ.

#### GOSPEL - Mark 10:17-31

Jesus has been teaching his disciples about what is most valued in God's eyes. Now, a conversation with a rich man brings his message home to the disciples in a way that is surprising but unforgettable.

#### OCTOBER 17—21ST SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Today's gospel starts with disciples obsessing over who will be closest to Jesus, leading to Jesus teaching his followers about God's take on importance and power. Here Jesus makes it explicit that the reversal of values in God's community is a direct challenge to the values of the dominant culture, where wielding power over others is what makes you great. When we pray "your kingdom come" we are praying for an end to tyranny and oppression. We pray this gathered around the cross, a sign of great shame transformed to be the sign of great honor and service.

#### FIRST READING - Isaiah 53:4-12

This reading is from the last of four passages in Isaiah that are often called "servant songs." Christians are probably most familiar with this servant song. In light of Christian faith, the servant's healing

ministry and redemptive suffering are understood to be fulfilled in the life and death of Christ.

#### PSALM - Psalm 91:9-16

You have made the LORD your refuge, and the Most High your habitation. (Ps. 91:9)

#### SECOND READING - Hebrews 5:1-10

Using imagery from scripture and from Jewish worship practices, Jesus is presented as the great high priest who was obedient to God's saving plan. Through his suffering and death he has become the source of eternal salvation.

#### GOSPEL - Mark 10:35-45

On the way to Jerusalem the disciples ask Jesus to grant them seats of honor. Jesus responds by announcing that he and his followers will "rule" through self-giving service.

#### OCTOBER 24—22ND SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Can we pray the way Bartimaeus prays? People try to hush him up because by addressing Jesus as "Son of David" he is making a politically dangerous claim that Jesus is the rightful king. Could our prayers ever be heard as a threat to unjust powers that be? Bartimaeus won't give up or go away quietly, but repeats his call for help more loudly. Do we ask so boldly? And are our prayers an honest answer to Jesus' question, "What do you want me to do for you?"

#### FIRST READING - Jeremiah 31:7-9

This passage speaks not only of the southern kingdom, Judah, and its homecoming from exile in Babylon, but also of the northern kingdom ("Israel" or "Ephraim") and its restoration. The northern tribes of Israel had been lost in exile to Assyria more than a century before Jeremiah prophesied.

#### PSALM - Psalm 126

Those who sowed with tears will reap with songs of joy. (Ps. 126:5) **SECOND READING – Hebrews 7:23-28** 

Human priests of old offered sacrifice for their own sins and served only until their death. In contrast, Jesus is God's Son, the holy, sinless, resurrected high priest. Death did not terminate his priestly service, but through his death he has interceded for our sins.

#### GOSPEL - Mark 10:46-52

Bartimaeus comes to Jesus with faith, asking that he might see again. Recognizing Jesus' identity, Bartimaeus is the first person to call him "Son of David" in the Gospel of Mark.

#### OCTOBER 31—REFORMATION DAY

Rooted in the past and growing into the future, the church must always be reformed in order to live out the love of Christ in an everchanging world. We celebrate the good news of God's grace, that Jesus Christ sets us free every day to do this life-transforming work. Trusting in the freedom given to us in baptism, we pray for the church, that Christians will unite more fully in worship and mission.

#### FIRST READING - Jeremiah 31:31-34

The renewed covenant will not be breakable, but like the old covenant it will expect the people to live upright lives. To know the LORD means that one will defend the cause of the poor and needy (Jer. 22:16). The renewed covenant is possible only because the LORD will forgive iniquity and not remember sin. Our hope lies in a God who forgets.

#### PSALM - Psalm 46

The LORD of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our stronghold. (Ps. 46:7)

#### SECOND READING - Romans 3:19-28

Paul's words stand at the heart of the preaching of Martin Luther and other Reformation leaders. No human beings make themselves right with God through works of the law. We are brought into a right relationship with God through the divine activity centered in Christ's death. This act is a gift of grace that liberates us from sin and empowers our faith in Jesus Christ.

#### GOSPEL - John 8:31-36

Jesus speaks of truth and freedom as spiritual realities known through his word. He reveals the truth that sets people free from sin.
