ADVENT DEVOTIONAL ITEMS

The Learning and Worship Life Committees are providing several special



items to be used during our Advent season, which begins Sunday, November 28. These Advent materials are available on the table in the Narthex. Please take only what your family will use; materials are limited. We encourage you to use them to enhance your Advent season as we prepare and anticipate the celebration of the birth of our Lord and Savior.

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As most of you know we change the colors of the paraments and vestments in worship with the changes in liturgical season. As we begin a new church year on the first Sunday of Advent we also change colors to blue—a color symbolizing hope. Advent is the only time during the church year that we use blue paraments and vestments. We get four short weeks of preparation and expectant waiting during the Advent season to get ready for the joy and wonder of the Christmas season. That is only four weeks of blue.

When I was ordained a decade ago, my internship congregation gifted me with a blue stole. They knew that blue is my favorite color and (not coincidentally) that Advent is my favorite church season. Also on the occasion of my ordination, my grandmother made several blue stoles for me. I think I've picked up a few more over the years as gifts or from pastors who were downsizing their stole inventory. Now that I am blessed to serve as your pastor, I usually wear the stole and chasuble that the church owns during worship. The irony is, I have far more blue stoles than we have Sundays in which I can wear them!

My first year of ministry I laid out my numerous blue stoles to get ready for Advent, trying to decide which one to wear for that season. I then noticed each one was a different shade of blue. One was deep, almost midnight blue. Another was a bright, royal blue. The others fell somewhere in between. I decided to pick four contrasting stoles and to wear a different one each Sunday in Advent. I arranged the order to go from darkest to lightest. So as the Advent wreath got brighter with a new candle each week, so my blue vestments got brighter. In contrast, the days of late fall drew shorter and shorter. The sunlight outside lasted a shorter time each week. Yet even as the darkness seemed overpowering, the increasing brightness of the wreath candles and of my stoles sent a powerful message to those gathered in worship: God's light is come into our dark world.

As we look around us in the world, it is easy to think things are getting dimmer and darker. Things look bleak at times, between illness and loss, financial difficulties and complicated family dynamics, insults and injuries. It is not hard to look around and think things are getting worse.

Yet the good news that we await and proclaim this season is that God's light and love have drawn near to us. Christ comes to us "a flow'r so bright, amid the cold of winter, when half-spent was the night," to quote the beloved hymn *Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming (ELW 272)*.

That is the joy and anticipation of this season: That against all odds and despite all appearances to the contrary, Christ comes to and for us, exchanging his glorious light for our gloomy darkness. May God reveal to us new and wonderful signs that Christ's light is coming to us anew this season.

In previous years, Good Shepherd has supported the S.C. Synod's Gifts of Hope program. However, that program is not available this year and is being re-evaluated for future years.

SUPPORTING SOCIAL MINISTRY PROJECTS

In recent months, Good Shepherd congregation has donated more than \$3,100 to various social ministry emphases.

The Big Red Barn Retreat, which provides therapeutic services for military veterans and first responders, received \$750.

Palmetto Place, a temporary shelter for abused and neglected children, was the recipient of the October 31 noisy offering and received \$525.

Lutheran Services Carolinas received \$687 to support its services in South Carolina for women with addictions, foster children, and Afghan refugee resettlement.

Lutheran Disaster Response received \$1,170 to help with its immediate and long-range support for victims of wildfires and flooding in the U.S.

Total contributions in September and October were \$3,132. Donations for the November social ministry emphasis, the VA Food Pantry, will continue to be received through the first part of December.

The Social Ministry Committee thanks you for your support of all these causes as we reach out to help the needy in our community.

2022 OFFERING ENVELOPES GETTING CREDIT FOR YOUR OFFERINGS

Donations are effective only in the year in which they are offered. A check received in January 2022 cannot be credited for 2021 even if it is dated "2021." Make sure your **mailing envelope is postmarked by December 31, 2021.** Then, even if it arrives in 2022, the check is still deductible for 2021.

The **best way to make sure your offerings are credited** to your account is to use the Good Shepherd numbered offering envelopes assigned to you. Using your assigned offering envelopes helps the offering tabulators and myself for record-keeping purposes and posting to the correct accounts.

Each Sunday, a devoted group of your fellow members are tabulating and processing your contributions. To help them do their job and make it easier for them, please do the following;

- 1. Use your assigned offering envelopes or a pink special envelope. If using a pink special envelope, please indicate which fund the contribution is to be applied.
- 2. Write your name on the envelope.
- 3. Write the amount on the envelope.

To our friends at Good Shepherd:

Bless and thank you for your exceeding generosity.

On behalf of the residents and staff at Providence Home, we are humbled by and grateful for your \$2,000 grant.

It was an unexpected and wonderful gift – perfectly timed. But that is how our God works, and at Providence Home, we have come to rest, rely on, and rejoice in His provision and His timing. He is so good, and we are awed by how he has used this wonderful congregation in such a mighty way.

Rest assured this grant will be put to good use. We are in the process of building a new chapel on campus. We consider it the most important project in our nearly six-decade history as our men have never had a sacred space to pray and receive life-affirming, confidential counseling. Thanks to your rich provision, we will be able to purchase the seating needed for our new chapel.

Providence Home is dedicated to redeeming and restoring men in transition – those coming out of prison or recovering from substance abuse or other trauma – through the life-saving grace of Jesus Christ. We have room for 60 men. Residents are required to work off campus, do chores on campus, and pay \$100 a week room and board that includes all their meals and laundry. We help them gain access to medical care and strive to meet their emotional and spiritual needs with mandatory chapel and a mentoring program.

We think of ourselves as "The We You Don't See" because many drive by our quiet, tidy campus on North Main Street, Columbia, and don't even realize we are here. We take great pride in being good neighbors; our men are prohibited from loitering, and they must be completely drug and alcohol free.

Most of our men stay between four-12 months, but there is no hard fast rule for departure. We want them healthy and ready to embrace life away from us, so stay times vary. For a man to be considered "graduated" from our program, he must show fiscal responsibility in having enough money saved to cover two months' rent, a church home (when applicable), restoration with family if possible, and at least six months completely free of any substance.

It is so vital that folks know we are here. Recent studies show that almost 50% of all American families have been impacted by substance abuse – with the problem escalating dramatically during the isolation of the Covid-19 crisis. Men come to us straight from prison, referred by an agency or rehab center, or off the street. A face-to-face interview with our program director is mandatory for any man coming into our program.

Please know that we are here for *your* family should you ever need us, just as Good Shepherd has been there for ours. Our God is a God of hope and hope lives at Providence Home. 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LECTIONARY FOR DECEMBER 2021

DECEMBER 5—SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Forerunners and messengers advance the advent of our God. While John the baptizer's voice in the wilderness may be the principal focus of the day, Malachi's prophecy could as easily herald the coming Christ as forerunner of the LORD of hosts. Finally all the baptized are called to participate in the sharing of the gospel. In so doing we prepare the way for the coming of Jesus and assist all people in capturing a vision of the "salvation of God."

FIRST READING - Malachi 3:1-4

God announces a covenant with Israel. A messenger like Malachi (his name means "my messenger") will prepare the way for the coming of the Lord by purifying and refining God's people, as silver and gold are refined.

PSALM – Luke 1:68-79

In the tender compassion of our God the dawn from on high shall break upon us. (Lk. 1:78)

SECOND READING - Philippians 1:3-11

The apostle Paul was the pastor of many new churches. He writes in this letter about his joy to be in partnership with the Christians of Philippi. Listen to how tender-hearted Paul, sometimes a stern preacher, is with his friends as he encourages them to grow in love and knowledge.

GOSPEL - Luke 3:1-6

John the Baptist is a herald of Jesus, whose way is prepared by "repentance for the forgiveness of sins." As we hear the careful record of human leaders, we sense the spectrum of political and religious authority that will be challenged by this coming Lord.

DECEMBER 12—THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Christ's presence in our midst in the wonder of the holy supper is cause for singing. The nearness of the God in prayer, in every circumstance, is cause for rejoicing. The coming of one "more powerful" than John, even with a winnowing fork in hand, is good news—and cause for exultation—for us who are being saved. Great joy is the tone for the third Sunday of Advent.

FIRST READING - Zephaniah 3:14-20

The prophet Zephaniah's message is mostly one of judgment for sin. This reading, however, which comes from the conclusion of the book, prophesies joy for Judah and Jerusalem. Judgment has led to repentance, and God's salvation is at hand.

PSALM – Isaiah 12:2-6

In your midst is the Holy One of Israel. (Is. 12:6)

SECOND READING - Philippians 4:4-7

Despite being in prison, Paul is remarkably upbeat as he writes this letter. Here, he urges his friends in Philippi to trust God with all their worries and concerns with the hope that they will experience God's joy and peace.

GOSPEL - Luke 3:7-18

John the Baptist heralds the mighty one who is coming. John teaches that preparation for God's reign is not a matter of identity but of bearing fruits of merciful justice, radical generosity, and vocational integrity.

DECEMBER 19—FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Cradle and cross are inextricably connected on the fourth Sunday of Advent. Between a lovely tribute to the little town of Bethlehem and Mary's magnificent song of praise, the letter to the Hebrews reminds us in no uncertain terms that Christ's advent is for "the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all." It is the kind of tension in which the church always lives as when in holy communion—with high delight—"we proclaim the Lord's death."

FIRST READING - Micah 5:2-5a

The prophet Micah, having pronounced judgment upon Judah, speaks of a future shepherd-king who, like David, will come from the small town of Bethlehem. (Ephrathah refers to the area around Bethlehem.) This king will restore Israel and bring peace. New Testament writers understood this passage to be referring to Jesus.

PSALM – Psalm 80:1-7

Let your face shine upon us, and we shall be saved. (Ps. 80:7)

SECOND READING – Hebrews 10:5-10

The author of Hebrews uses the image of religious sacrifice to convey the significance of Christ's coming. Through obedient acceptance of God's will, Christ allows his own body to become the greatest sacrifice of all, one through which we are made a holy people.

GOSPEL – Luke 1:39-55

Elizabeth, John's mother, and Mary, the mother of Jesus, are two women filled with the Holy Spirit and with faith. In Elizabeth's inspired greeting and Mary's song of praise we hear of a saving God who remembers, scatters, lifts up, and fulfills all things.

DECEMBER 26—FIRST SUNDAY OF CHRISTMAS

On the first Sunday of Christmas we find the boy Samuel and the boy Jesus, both in the temple, both growing in wisdom and stature and in favor with God and humankind. We too have returned to the house of God "to sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God," who has gifted us with a savior. As the festival continues, "let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts." It is Christmas, still.

FIRST READING - 1 Samuel 2:18-20, 26

Having dedicated her son Samuel to God's service, Hannah visits him every year when she and her husband Elkanah come to the temple to offer sacrifices. God grants Hannah more children, and Samuel himself gains favor in the sight of all.

PSALM - Psalm 148

The splendor of the LORD is over earth and heaven. (Ps. 148:13)

SECOND READING - Colossians 3:12-17

Just as newly baptized Christians in the early church were clothed with new garments upon arising from the baptismal waters, so all who have received God's gift of life in Jesus Christ are covered with the character of Christ.

GOSPEL – Luke 2:41-52

Jesus grew up in a family that went to the Passover festival each year. It was in this environment of faithful adherence to the law that Jesus grew into spiritual maturity and an understanding of his identity and mission.


